BETHEL ANNIVERSARY DAY
Rev. A. P. Mershon, a Former Pastor, Was the Preacher on Sunday.

The forty-eighth anniversary of Bethel Congregational church was observed on Sunday. The services were very largely attended. A special offering of \$500 was asked for and the sum \$340 was placed on the plates on Sunday and the remainder will be in hand Monday. The preacher at the services was Rev. A. P. Mershon of Pen. Argyll, Pa., a former pastor of the church. At the morning service Rev. Mr. Mershon preached from Matt. XVI: 18. "Upon this rock I will build My Church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it." In the evening his text was I Cor. I: 25: "The foolishness of God is wiser than men, and the weakness of God is stronger than men."

Special music was given at both services, as follows: Solos by Miss Gertrude Holland and Dr. Allan Haffner; anthem by choir and male quartette composed of Dr. Allan and Fred Haffner, Fred Wilson and William Thompson.

On the evening of May 21st, 1874 a little company of believers met together and organized Bethel Congregational church. Throughout the intervening years this church has had the privilege and the joy of ministering to a great many people in Kingston, and while many of its former members and adherents have gone to their reward, and many others for various reasons have since affiliated with other bodies in this community and in places far removed, hundreds of these still retain a warm spot in their hearts for "little Bethel," where they received their earliest training and inspiration.

Throughout these forty-eight years, Bethel church has faithfully, fearlessly and consistently proclaimed the gospel of Jesus Christ from its pulpit, and it has occupied no small sphere of service and influence in the community.

MORE ROAD CONTRACTS HAVE BEEN AWARDED

McGinnis and O'Connor to Build Piece of Kingston-Ottawa Highway.

It is announced that McGinnis and O'Connor, Kingston, have been awarded the contract by the Ontario Highways Department to build four miles of macadam base on the Kingston-Ottawa highway, beginning at Barriefield.

E. G. Law Company, Toronto, has been awarded the contract for the patching and surface treatment of traxis B. of the nine and one-half miles of road from Barriefield to the Finger Board.

Curran and Briggs, Toronto, are building culverts at Washburn. W. Holcroft, Queen's University student, has the contract to build culverts at Elgin.

McGinnis & O'Connor, road contractors, have finished the piece of roadway near the Finger Board. Last fall on account of the weather getting cold, it was impossible to finish the road satisfactorily, so the contractors decided this spring to put some finishing touches on it, which were completed last week.

The road from Kingston for a distance of ten miles is about the best piece of roadway in Eastern Ontario.

GRADUATES HONOR DR. SHORTT

Distinguished Professor Guest at Event Held by Former Students.

Graduates of Queen's University paid tribute to Dr. Adam Shortt, an oldtime graduate of the famous institution and more lately one of its faculty, at an informal dinner held recently at the Empress Hotel at Victoria, B.C., when a most pleasant time was spent in recounting reminiscences of their Alma Mater.

Advantage of the presence in the city of Dr. Shortt, who is in the city, investigating civic taxation matters, was taken by the Queen's men, and the reunion was thoroughly enjoyed by all. Dr. H. E. Young, provincial health officer, a classmate of Dr. Shortt's at Queen's, was unable to attend the function, being out of town. He sent his regrets.

Old memories of Queen's were revived, college songs rendered, and the college yell was enthusiastically given. Dr. Shortt's reminiscences were greatly enjoyed.

Entering Queen's University in 1870, Dr. Shortt, after a post-graduate course in the old country, returned to his alma mater and filled the chair of political economy. His career in the university has been a brilliant one, and he is a man whom graduates of the institution everywhere delight to honor. W. E. Cook was elected registrar for the Victoria district.

Greater Demand Forces Prices Up. The increased consumption of tea in 1921 (during which year, by agreement, the tea growers of Ceylon and India had curtailed production) forced the price of tea steadily upwards to the present abnormally high level. The lowering of the duty in England will mean still greater demand, and authorities on tea tell us that still higher prices may be expected.

PROVINCIAL HIGHWAYS.

Report on Highway Conditions, issued by Department.

Light grading and dragging have been steadily carried on during the past few weeks and the provincial highways, where sufficiently advanced, are good. Numerous contracts for paving, grading and other construction are being let, and contractors will be starting work immediately. Oiling and tarring are being carried on, and while temporarily inconvenient later results will be of marked advantage. The necessity of certain detours will be unavoidable; but detours are being marked and turning points shown. The Department of Public Highways is endeavoring to keep these detours in condition as far as it is economically reasonable to do so.

Toronto to Kingston—Toronto to Port Hope, very good from Rouge Hill to Port Hope. Town of Oshawa laying pavement and detours within town. Port Hope to Belleville in good condition throughout. Please drive slowly where construction is in progress. No detours. Belleville to Kingston, good. Eight miles between Napanee and Kingston rough. No detours.

Kingston to Quebec Boundary—Kingston to Gananoque, from Kingston 9 1-2 miles east excellent. Rest of the road fair. Go slow 1 1-2 miles west of Gananoque on account of grading. Gananoque to Brockville, fair. Use Lyn Road from Yonge's Mills to Brockville. Please drive slowly where signs appear as there will be heavy construction ahead. Brockville to Prescott, good. Prescott to Quebec boundary—Johnstown to Morrisburg good except one mile west of Cardinal now under construction. No detours. Morrisburg to Dickinson's Landing, fair in dry weather. Dickinson's Landing to Cornwall, good. Four roadside culvert detours between Manlinck and Maple Grove. Detours in good conditions. Cornwall to Meadow Bay, fair in dry weather. Meadow Bay to Quebec boundary, good.

Port Hope to Peterboro—Road in good condition. Drive slowly through construction. Roadside culvert detours south of Bewdley and north of Centerville. Detours in good condition.

Pleton to Foxboro—Pleton to Belleville, good gravel road. Belleville to Foxboro, rough. No detours.

Kingston to Ottawa—(via Smith's Falls)—Kingston to Smith's Falls, road fair. Culvert contract between Kingston and Seely's Bay. Culvert and grading construction two miles each side of Elgin. Smith's Falls to Ottawa, Smith's Falls to Port Elmsley, in good condition all the way. Port Elmsley to Perth, culverts under construction, fair condition. Perth to Boyd's Corners, good. Boyd's Corners to Carleton Place road and culverts under construction, in fair condition for traffic. Carleton Place to Ashton Corners, good. Ashton Corners to Stanley Corners, road and culverts under construction and in fair condition for motor traffic. Stanley Corners to Stittsville, good. Stittsville to Bells Corners, road and culverts under construction. In fair condition for motor traffic. Bells Corners to Ottawa, road in good condition with the exception of section between Bells Corners station and the junction of Richmond Road and Base line, section impassable in wet weather.

Toronto to Hamilton—(via Dundas street)—Dundas street to Cooksville, excellent. Surface fair Cooksville to 16 Mile Creek. 16 Mile Creek to Clappsons closed—under construction, through traffic for Guelph detour at Trafalgar village south to Oakville to Hamilton Highway.
