EXPOSED A FAKE MEDIUM

What Canon Scott, Quebec, Did at a Private Spiritualistic Seance.

Quebec, May 22.—A description of his impressions of a spiritualistic seance recently was given by Canon Scott, of Quebec, just before he sailed for England on the liner Montrose. He said: "Last winter I was present at a private seance given by an American professional woman medium, a friend of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle and Sir Oliver Lodge. There were present, besides the host and his brother, a prominent Quebec lawyer and a well known educationalist. The woman was a trumpet medium and she claimed that the spirit of a Dr. Sharp, who died in Edinburgh 160 years ago, spoke through the trumpet, which stood in the middle of the floor. "After the lights were turned out and the voice had been speaking for some time, I became aware that the trumpet was coming in my direction. I moved very quickly in the darkness towards the centre of the room, and touched the good lady who was standing there talking through the trumpet, which, in her surprise, she dropped to the floor. "At once the voice stopped and the lights were turned on. The medium did not know who had touched her, but was offered some whiskey and water or a glass of wine, to restore her equanimity, and to link us once again with the spirit world. Being in Canada, and not in the United States, this was possible. "When I said I was the one who had interrupted the performance, I was told that I had broken the connection between the living and the dead, and, apparently, not even the glass of wine which the medium drank was able to restore it. The strange fact was that the old Scotch doctor had a very pronounced American accent, even through the tin trumpet gave his utterance an unnatural sound. Why he should have dropped his Scotch brogue and adopted a New England twang is a question which I leave to the sincere ingenuity of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle. "My advice to everyone who wishes to attend a seance is to take a flashlight with him. Unfortunately, when I went to get mine to take with me I found the battery was not working. I guarantee that if he turns on the light he will discover the fraud as I did. No man is intellectually fit to go to a seance who declines to take with him and use a flashlight, and no medium can be trusted who objects to such a test of truth."

THIS ARMY APPEARS DOOMED TO FAILURE

Veterans' March From Toronto to Ottawa Not Sanctioned by G.W.V.A.

The "army" of unemployed veterans, which is marching from Toronto to Ottawa, is gradually dwindling, according to reports received from along their route, and very little enthusiasm has been shown in the various towns visited up to the present. It is understood that the marching men number about three hundred now.

Upon enquiry at the local veterans organization, the Whig was told that no official sanction had been given to the "march" by any officers of the various branches of the returned men's organization. When asked as to the possibility of any Kingston men joining up with the column, if they should touch Kingston, one member of the executive of the G. W. V. A. stated that he thought it highly improbable that any local veterans would have anything to do with the movement. In the opinion of those in well-informed circles, the "army" is doomed to failure, before reaching Ottawa, as there has been considerable wrangling already among the leaders.

At Cobourg, on Friday, Charles A. Munson, ex-M.P. for Northumberland, passed away. Deceased had been seriously ill from blood poison since last September. He was born in Cobourg sixty-four years ago. The pope has sent Patriarch Baralisina to London to speak a personal interview with Premier Lloyd George, at which he will advocate the views and plans of the Vatican regarding the religious future of Palestine.

The Soviets are coining new silver coins from precious metals confiscated from the Russian churches.

The British attorney-general, Sir Ernest Pollock, states that women are eligible with men for appointment to judgeships.

Enrico Caruso's body is still on view in the National cemetery and can be seen by anyone curious enough to visit it.

The threat of coercive measures has brought Hungary to terms in the matter of delivery of cattle under the reparations terms of the peace treaty.

The Regal Tire and Rubber Company, Sherbrooke, Que., has been officially placed in liquidation, and the property may soon be offered for sale.

Fire losses in Canada during the week ended May 17th are estimated by the Monetary Times at \$489,767, compared with \$760,300 the previous week.

Rev. Dr. O. C. S. Wallace, formerly chancellor of McMaster University, Toronto, may be the new editor of the Canadian Baptist, in succession to the late Rev. Dr. Mackay.

Sir Charles Parsons, head of the firm of C. A. Parsons and Co., Newcastle-on-Tyne, has given £10,000 to the British Association for the Advancement of Science, to aid research work.

The fruit crop of the Niagara district has suffered very little damage from the wind and rain storms which have visited the section of late, and the prospects for a bumper crop are very bright.

A proposal to raise the speed limit in the country from the present twenty-five to thirty miles an hour is one of several amendments to the Motor Vehicles Act introduced in the Ontario legislature.

A loan to Germany is now assured and soon France will have no pretext for advancing into the Ruhr valley. The Morgans, of New York, are behind it. Forty million dollars are also to be advanced to Austria.

Thomas Joplin, financial secretary of the Shantymen's Christian Association of Canada and the United States, who is in the city for a few days, in the interests of his work, had a very busy Sunday.
