THE COLLEGIATE CONCERT

In Grant Hall on Friday Evening Was Very Largely Attended.

The enthusiasm of the big audience assembled in Grant Hall to witness the Gymnastic Concert by talented pupils of the Kingston Collegiate Institute on Friday evening, knew no bounds. Every number was repeatedly applauded, and the presentation of the prizes won in the interesting athletic events of the Field Day brought rounds of applause for the successful contestants. The concert was the fitting culmination of a big day for the students, and it brought a large attendance of parents and teachers all of whom heartily enjoyed the splendid programme. Joseph C. Elliott, member of the board of education, presided and announced each number. He complimented the teachers and pupils upon the fine showing in the athletic events of the day, and upon the deep sense of appreciation indicated by the presence of so large an audience.

E. O. Giller presented the prizes awarded to the winners and, in addition to those named in the report of the several events, special silver medals were presented to those obtaining the highest aggregate. They were: senior boys, Rowland Hewgill, G. McKelvey; Junior boys, D. Skelton, A. Johnston. Special prize for running, Rowland Hewgill and D. Skelton. Senior girls, Miss Easton, first; Miss Vince and Miss Bidwell (tied for second). The announcement of the names of these winners was greeted with the K.C.I. "yell," showing unanimous approval of the decisions of the judges.

The concert was opened with a fine performance by a large class of boys upon parallel bars under the direction of Captain Harry Law, physical director of the Collegiate Institute, and the physical performance of both the boys and girls throughout was a testimonial to his work. The second number was a bar bell drill by a class of girls.

A fine exhibition of military drill, "Manual of Arms," was given by "C" Company P.W.O.R. under command of Corporal H. Holsgrove. The company through rifle exercises, including fixing and unfixing of bayonets, like veterans and received merited applause.

A very pretty number was the Dutch Dolls Dance given by Misses Gladys Hughes, Freda Simmons, Florence Niven and Lois LeHeup.

A series of games was played by two teams of girls under the direction of Captain Law. They included "Colonel Murphy," "Ball Passing" and "Relay Race."

The "Awkward Squad" under Fred Vokes (clown) and Melville Lennox, created great amusement. Some very clever acting was seen in this number.

The girls were seen in the gymnastic dance "Sailors' Hornpipe" both swinging and marching, and acquitted themselves in a very creditable manner.

The final number "The Pyramid," by thirty boys, was a great achievement. These lads by patient practice showed what could be done in the way of spectacular work and the successful building of the human pyramid on the stage excited great admiration on the part of the audience. It was a K.C.I. audience and the performers received the utmost encouragement. They earned it too and showed that there are tremendous possibilities of them in the future.

Two vocal numbers, by Miss Christine Diack, soprano, and Henry Hill, baritone, singing instructor for the city schools, were greatly enjoyed.

The piano accompanists in the marching and drills were Miss Madelyn McKendry and Miss Kathleen Lyons, while Professor Gummer played for Mr. Hill. Miss Marjorie Reginald played for the Dutch Dolls dance.

CANON W. F. FITZGERALD AT PROVIDENCE, R. I.

Addressed the British Empire Club in That City Wednesday Last.

The Journal of Providence, R. I. of Thursday, has the following: "Delightful reminiscences of persons, places and contacts in the life of the Rev. Canon William Frederick Fitzgerald, M.A., of Trinity College, Dublin, rector of St. Paul's Anglican Church, Kingston, Ontario, as set forth by him, proved a bright spot in the post-prandial programme of the British Empire Club observance of Empire day and the 103rd anniversary of the birthday of Queen Victoria, held at the Turks Head club, Wednesday night.

Canon Fitzgerald, who was a distinguished guest, lauded the loyalty of the British Empire during the recent world war and spoke in praising manner of the achievements of Britain's armed forces. He added that such organizations as the British Empire Club were doing a great work in keeping alive the traditions and achievements of America and Great Britain, who, he said, are bound by one people, one language, and one democracy.

"In conclusion Canon Fitzgerald urged the development of a spiritual consciousness in the minds of all people and said: 'I care not in what church you believe, I care not to what country you owe allegiance, if you interpret your lives in sweet reasonableness, you are builders in the world.'"

A vote of thanks to Canon Fitzgerald was moved by Mr. Beeckman, ex-governor of Rhode Island, and seconded by Attorney-General Rice.
