K.C.I. STUDENTS ARE GOOD ATHLETES

Their Prowess Shown in Annual Field Sports on Friday.

The annual field sports of the Kingston Collegiate Institute were staged in the George Richardson Stadium on Friday morning and afternoon, before a large crowd of pupils, teachers, parents and friends of the school. Some splendid athletic prowess was displayed by the contestants in the various events, and the work of every boy and girl showed the careful training and development of talent in sports that is in vogue at this school at the present time. The traditions of K.C.I. during the past years show some wonderful records in sport of every variety, and the exhibition on Friday assured the spectators, among whom were many of the alumni, that this spirit of sportsmanship has not died out.

Very keen competition prevailed throughout, and some of the results were exceptionally close, in many cases requiring an extra "innings," in baseball phraseology. In the senior boys' division, S. Bailey cleared 5 ft. 5 1/2 in. in the running high jump, and this was a record to be envied by many older athletes. Roland Hewgill and G. McKelvey, the latter, by the way, a brother of "Red" McKelvey of Queen's athletic fame, were among the leaders in the senior events. Miss Easton, Miss Vince and Miss Bidwell lead in the girls' competition; while in the junior boys' division, D. Skelton and A. Johnston were well up.

Herd Tested; Found Wanting. To have his whole herd of fifteen head of cattle wiped out is the experience of James Couch, a farmer of North Elmsley township, near Smith's Falls, who had a government veterinary surgeon test his cattle for listing as an accredited herd. All of the cows were found to be more or less affected with tuberculosis, although all were in good condition otherwise. The federal government will recoup Mr. Couch to the extent of two-thirds of his loss. Smaller losses in the same direction have been experienced by other farmers in the same locality.

Renfrew Councillor Defeats Hold-up Man

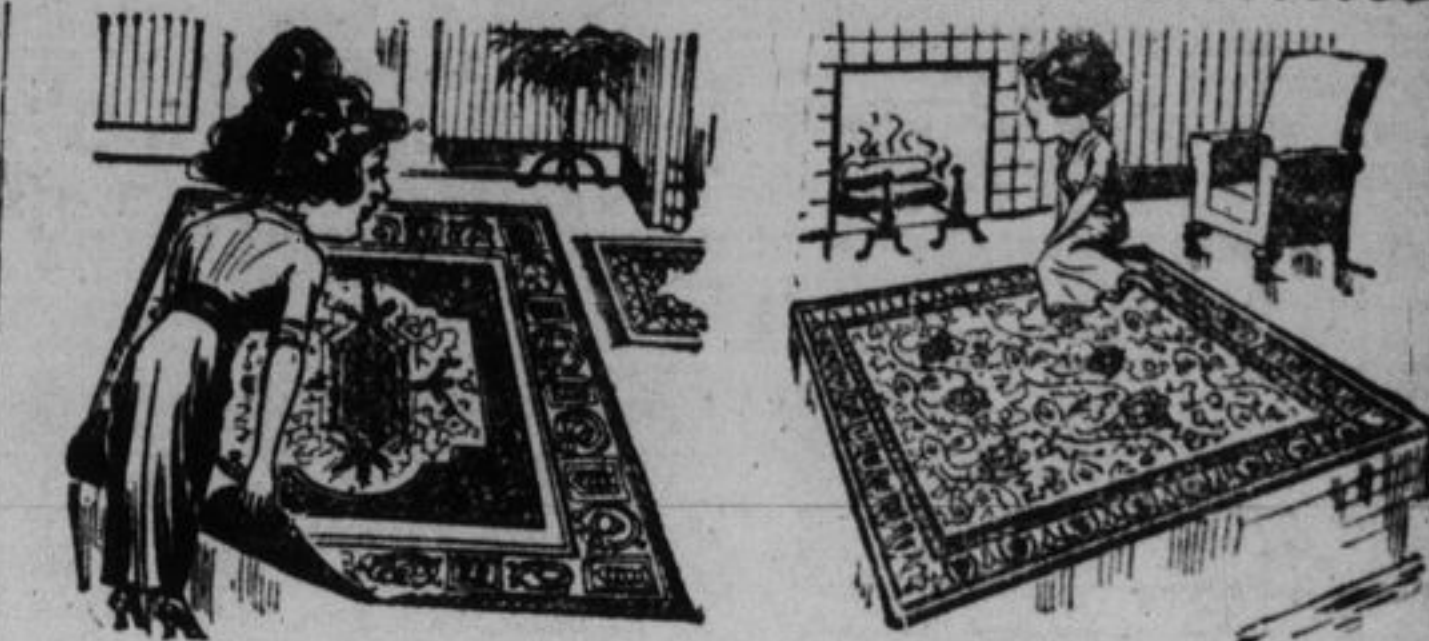
Renfrew, May 27.—Reeve McEwen while returning from council half a block from his own home, was stopped by a man who appeared from behind the hedge, and ordered to hold up his hands. The footpad was armed with a heavy piece of lead. He was too quick for the highwayman, and struck him a heavy blow between the eyes, following up his attack with vigorous kicks. The footpad dropped his blilly and disappeared in the neighboring ravine. The case is now in the hands of the police, but there is no clue, as the man was a stranger to Mr. McEwen, who was unable to get a good view of him. This is the first incident of the kind that has been reported in Renfrew for years.

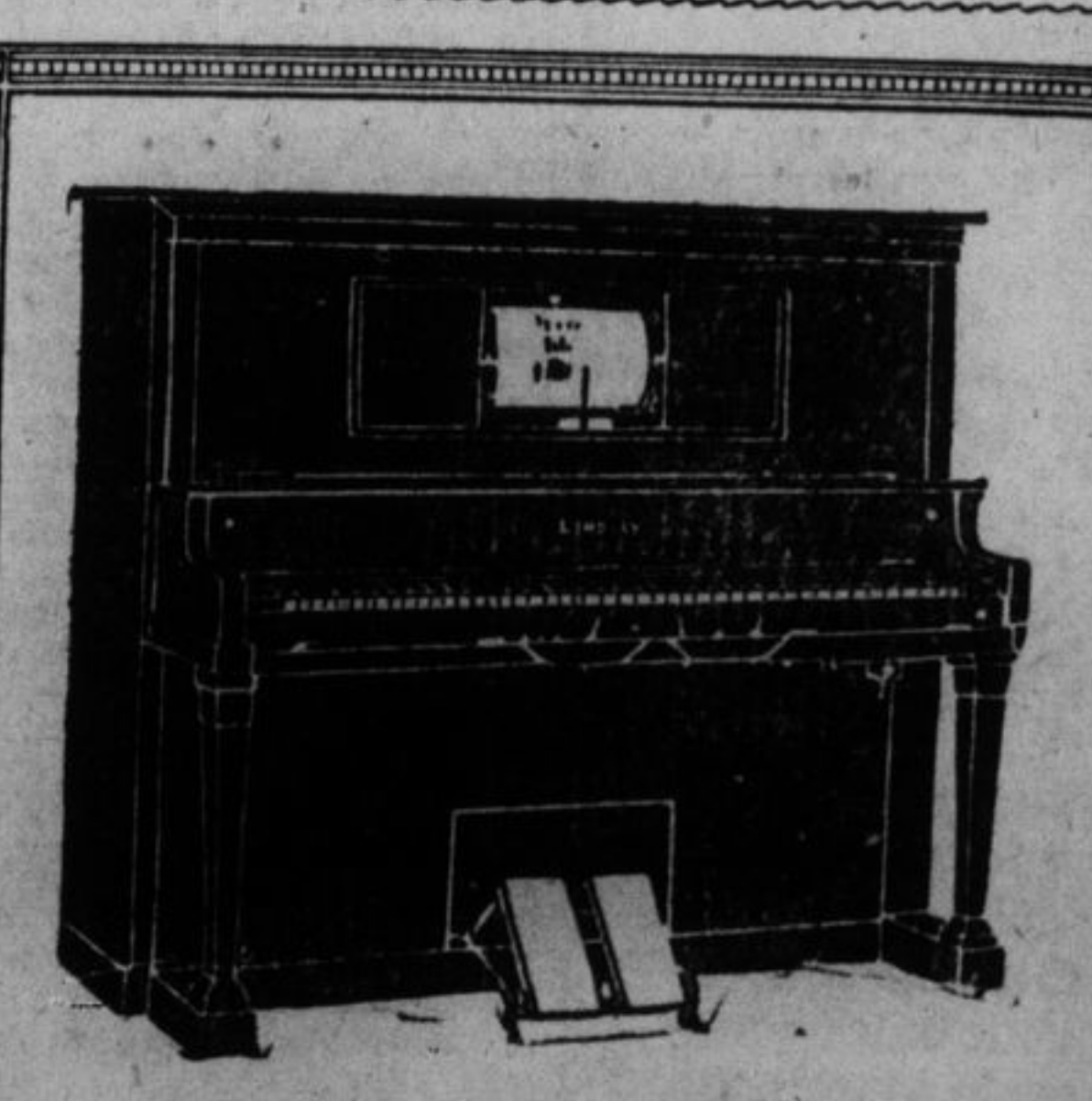
