### ONTARIO STREET BOY MISSING THREE DAYS

**Archie Hollywood, Ontario Street, Left Home Wednesday on His Bicycle.**

Archie Hollywood, aged fourteen, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Hollywood, Ontario street, near Union, is missing and his parents are greatly alarmed for his safety. He was last at home on the morning of May 24th and left home on his bicycle, which he rode every day. He attended Sydenham school and St. George's Sunday school. There was much anxiety when he did not come home on the afternoon of Wednesday, and on Thursday Mrs. Hollywood consulted the police. She was informed that he was not known but if anything was learned about him she would be informed. On Thursday Mrs. Hollywood went to consult a fortune-teller, and her fears were greatly excited when she was informed by the fortune-teller that her boy had met with an accident and was in an out-of-the-way place where he could not be seen. On Friday, no information was received, and the fortune-teller's story has caused much suffering on the part of Mrs. Hollywood. She is the mother of nine children and Archie was the second oldest.

Although living beside the water, Archie was not accustomed to playing about the wharves or in boats, and there is no reason to fear that he met with a mishap on the waterfront. There was absolutely no clue, however, as to his whereabouts up to Saturday morning.

**The Boy is Found.**  
Saturday, 11 a.m. — Mrs. Hollywood received word from relatives in Sharbot Lake this morning that Archie was in that village and was being sent home by relatives. It appears that he rode his bicycle all the way to Sharbot Lake on May 24th reaching there late in the afternoon. He located relatives of both parents there and was taken care of. His young sister left for Sharbot Lake by C.P.R. Saturday morning to meet him. The news created great rejoicing, for until receipt of the letter the worst fears were entertained.

### CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAYS

**Important Change Toronto-Winnipeg Service—"National" Restored.**

Effective Sunday, June 4th, Canadian National Railways will restore daily service between Toronto and Winnipeg via Capreol and Port Arthur. The train from Toronto, No. 3, "The National," will continue to leave at 10.35 p.m., standard time, and train from Winnipeg will arrive Toronto 5.15 p.m. These trains will carry most modern equipment of standard and tourist sleeping cars with compartment-observation-library cars and dining car service.

Through standard sleeper, Toronto-Winnipeg will leave as usual on Grand Trunk Railway train at 8.45 p.m. daily for North Bay where connection is made with the famous "Continental Limited" from Montreal for Vancouver and Pacific coast points so that the daily services through Port Arthur or Cochrane offer a pleasing choice of routes between Eastern and western Canada "The National Way."

### MEETING OF ROTARY CLUB

**Addresses Given by Members on Features of Rotary's Educational Work.**

The monthly business meeting of the Rotary Club was held in the British American hotel on Friday evening and a new feature inaugurated by the president, Leman A. Guild, consisted of brief addresses by individual members who will be required to speak on some feature of Rotary's educational work. The object of the president is to have every Rotarian secure a thorough knowledge of the principles, objects and ideals of Rotary. The necessity for this was realized by the international convention held at Watertown when Canadian Rotarians were the guests of their American brothers.

Rotarian W. Taylor Dale gave a report upon that convention and gave a high testimonial to the American Rotarians for the courtesy shown. He obtained there a new idea of Rotary and carried home the conviction that Rotary was not individual, nor provincial but international, for it extended wherever humanity was touched. It was the heart of humanity itself. The dominating spirit of the convention obliterated the international boundary between the two countries. It was the duty, therefore, of every Rotarian to attend such conventions—whenever the opportunity offered and receive the great inspiration to be derived. "For there you get to know something more about the objects and ideals of Rotary," declared Mr. Dale.

President Guild directed attention to the copies of the report on the international convention and requested the members to read them carefully in order that they might be prepared when called upon to discuss some feature of it.

Reports were presented by the different committees. These included an interesting report from Dr. H. E. Day upon the committee in charge of crippled children. He reviewed the work of the Kingston clinic and pointed out the opportunities for work by members of the club in helping to improve the lot of partially incapacitated children. There was much yet to do and inquiries were being pursued with a view to ascertaining the scope of the work.

Charles Anglin reported for the entertainment committee, and A. N. Lyster for the attendance committee. Rotarian Lyster directed attention to the position of the Kingston Club in the district standing. Rotary called for a live membership with 100 per cent attendance.

President Guild announced the committees appointed to handle the Chautauqua week which promises to be the great feature event of the summer. Many citizens have been making inquiries about Chautauqua and are looking forward to the splendid programme that always distinguishes Chautauqua from everything else. All are called upon to assist in making Chautauqua a complete success.

The meeting was enlivened by the singing of Rotary songs under the leadership of Harold Singleten and much amusement was caused by the ingenuity of the president in detecting and fining delinquents. Those who contributed to the exchequer were J. J. Stewart, Dr. H. E. Day, Al. Davis, H. Kelly, Charles Anglin and Rex Snelgrove.
