Cheque Tax Will Cost City \$1,000.
The new government tax on cheques will mean that the corporation of the city of Kingston will pay an additional thousand dollars a year on civic, utilities and school cheques. The city paid probably \$150 under the old system of two cents on a cheque. Every thousand dollar cheque the city handles will cost forty cents.

Milk Dropping in Price.
At Picton milk is down to seven cents a quart. On Tuesday morning the price dropped from ten cents to eight cents and on Wednesday morning there was a further drop to seven cents. The low price of cheese resulted in producers looking to the town trade for better returns and this competition has reduced prices.

Honor Mr. and Mrs. Chasse.
Mr. and Mrs. Chasse, whose marriage was recently celebrated in Renfrew, were given a silver tea service by the members of the choir of St. Francis Xavier church, of which Mrs. Chasse had been organist for the past nineteen years and in which her husband has also been one of the leading singers.

Arthur Gravelle, Renfrew, has returned from Chapeau, where he had been asked to open a safe belonging to the Bank of Montreal. On the ferry over the river at Pembroke. Capt. Medical Council Entertainments.

Stamps on Rural Routes.
In future the sale of postage stamps on rural routes will be limited to the book form of stamps. These books are made up of one, two and three-cent denominations, and sell at 25 cents per book. Couriers are being instructed that they are not required to sell stamps in less quantities than 25 cents worth, and in future all mail matter posted on the rural mail routes must be prepaid by postage stamps.
