**Condemned Board Rules.**  
At the meeting of the Frontenac  
Cheese Board of Thursday, George  
Smith, buyer, strongly condemned  
the practice of salesmen in boarding  
their cheese and afterward selling it  
on the street. "There should be a  
rule," said he, "making it compul-  
sory for all salesmen to board their  
cheese and sell it to the highest bid-  
der, with a fine for selling off the  
board. This would compel the buyers  
to name their limit at the board and  
all would then know where they  
were at." He stated that at Peter-  
boro and Stirling, selling on the  
curb was not permitted. Mr. Smith  
is one of the oldest and most experi-  
enced buyers in the business today.

**R. C. R. War Memorial.**  
A beautiful war memorial to all  
those officers and other ranks of the  
Royal Canadian regiment who fell in  
the great war has recently been plac-  
ed in the officers' mess at Wolsley  
Barracks, London, Ontario, where  
the headquarters and "C" company

of the regiment are at present sta-  
tioned.  
A total personnel of 11,089 of all  
ranks served with the regiment in  
France between November, 1915,  
and February, 1919, drawn original-  
ly from all parts of the dominion;  
later in the war, however, under the  
territorial system of recruiting, Nova  
Scotia in particular was the source  
from which the regiment obtained  
most of its re-inforcements.  
The casualties of the regiment  
were considerable—702 were killed  
in action, 2,407 wounded and 133  
missing.

**Mix-up Over King's Birthday.**  
There is a considerable mix-up  
over the observance of the king's  
birthday. The public schools will  
be closed on Monday, June 5th, to  
celebrate the day, according to ac-  
tion taken by the Board of Education  
and Mayor Corbett will issue a pro-  
clamation declaring Monday a public  
holiday. In compliance with that  
proclamation, the Retail Merchants'  
Association and local bodies will  
celebrate on Monday by decorating  
their residences and closing all  
places of business. But Monday  
will not be observed by a large sec-  
tion of the population. These people  
will celebrate the King's birthday on  
June 3rd, Saturday. They include  
the banks, and all public services,  
including railways, dominion and  
provincial institutions, post office,  
customs, etc.
