Protestant refugees from the south of Ireland are claiming compensation for loss of life, liberty, damage and expropriation suffered. Failing satisfaction from the British government these refugees, with influential backing, propose a petition of right to the Crown.

Catholic refugees are also flocking to England from Belfast and presumably they would have the same rights to relief and compensation as the southern Protestants.
