James the Second was the last monarch to perform this act. Alms are still distributed on this day, which is a Feast Day in the Anglican Church. 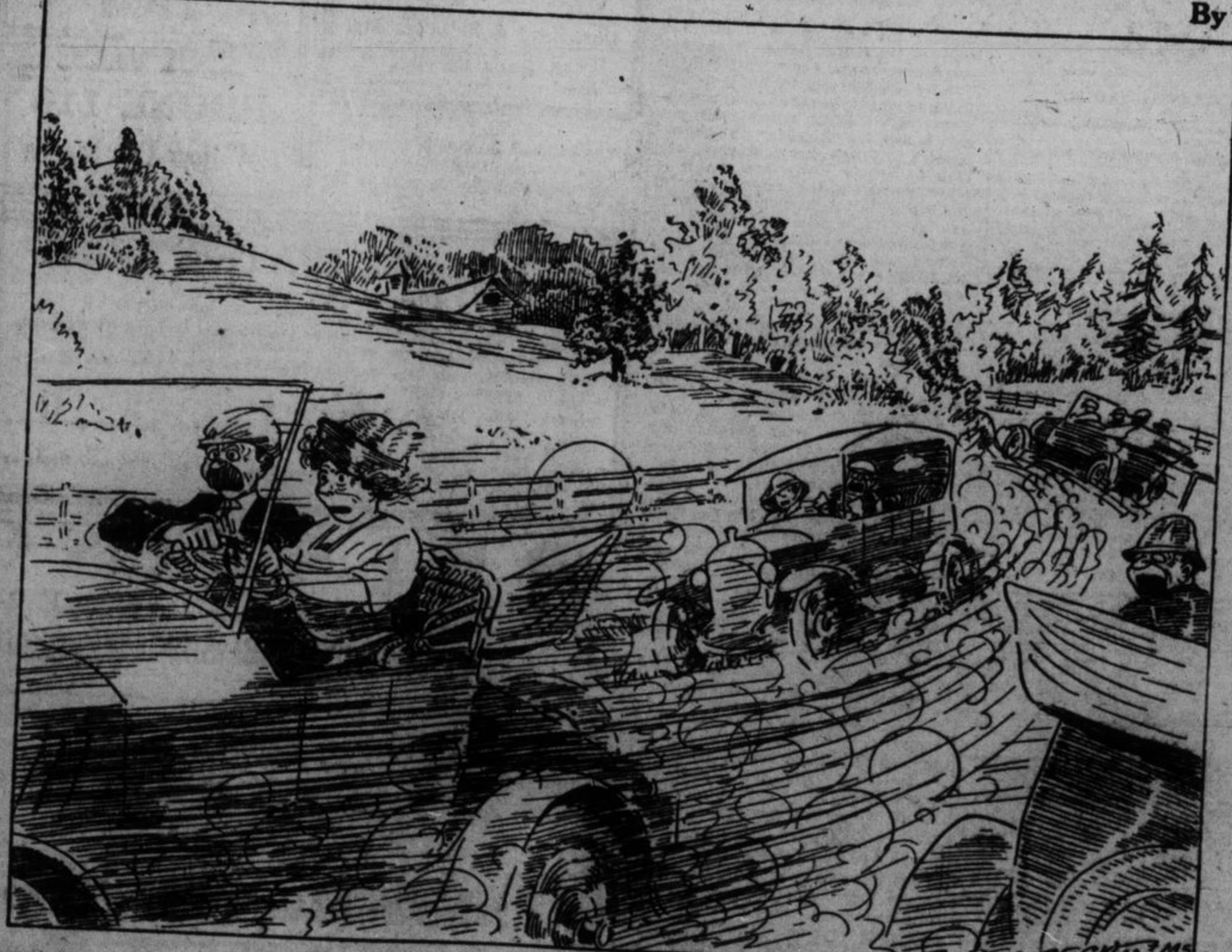
Back to Prince Edward.
