"It's good the street cars do not run all night," said Ald. Angrove.

**Must Close at 1 p.m.**  
On motion of Aids. O'Connor and Richardson the council granted the petition of R. H. Baker and others asking that a bylaw be passed compelling grocery stores to remain closed on Wednesday afternoons after one o'clock during June, July, August and September. Over seventy-five per cent. of the grocers signed the petition. The necessary bylaw was passed.  
The butchers also petitioned for a by-law similar to that of the grocers, and their request was granted. Hence, both butcher and grocery stores must close at 1 p.m. Wednesdays during the four months beginning with June.

**Board of Works.**  
These recommendations of the Board of Works were adopted:  
That the tender of McKelvey and Birch to install an apparatus on the asphalt plant at the fair grounds to remove the nuisance caused by the dust and soot while in operation for the sum of \$1,965, be accepted, provided that an agreement satisfactory to the city solicitor is entered into to the effect that they will guarantee the elimination of the soot and dust, and if not, the apparatus will be removed at their own expense, leaving the plant as they found it.  
That the request of the House of Providence for street watering on Ordinance street, between Montreal and Sydenham streets, be granted.  
That the request of the Bell Telephone Company to erect poles on Alfred street between Union and Johnson; Garrett street between Division and University; Johnson street between Division and University; York street between Barrie and Carlisle be granted.  
That Clarence street be paved from the railway tracks to the freight shed.  
That the city engineer be authorized to purchase coal and wood in the open market.  
That the city engineer be authorized to purchase 100 feet of Keystone hose for flushing purposes.

**Fire and Light.**  
The following report of the fire and light committee was adopted:  
That Engineer Way at the department be instructed to attend all fires as a fireman.  
That this committee be authorized to call and award tenders for winter clothing, 600 feet of hose, and that two ladders be purchased at an estimated cost of \$150.  
That the following lights be installed at the following places: Two tungsten lights on Hickson avenue; one arc light Macdonnell and Earl streets; one arc light corner Sixth and Alfred streets; 1 arc light driveway front fountain at Court House; light at corner Prime, Quebec and Plum streets, changed to show down Quebec street as designated by the fire and light committee.
