BROCK STREET CHURCH SALE MONEY DISCUSSED

The Methodist Conference Thinks a Fair Division Was Not Made.

(Continued From Page 1)
The Montreal Methodist conference endeavored to conclude its sessions at noon to-day but the amount of business coming up required another session this afternoon. The invitation of Brockville asking for the conference to be held in that city next year was accepted. The stationing committee read its final report indicating several changes from the first draft. The committee was in session until after midnight Tuesday evening. The committee on memorials also brought in several resolutions which will be passed on the general conference asking for legislation. The conference were unanimous in recommending that a pastor be stationed for not more than four years on a circuit and that a fifth year extension be granted by the stationing committee only when the condition of the work imperatively demands a longer time. The election of the board of examiners of the conference was the first item of business Wednesday morning and resulted in the following being added to the examiners in the English course, Rev. W. S. Lemmon, Rev. G. A. McIntosh, Rev. W. T. G. Brown, Rev. T. P. Perry, Rev. H. E. Warren, Rev. T. E. Holling, Rev. J. D. Ellis, Rev. J. R. R. Cooper, Rev. Wm. Raney, Rev. T. A. Halpenny, Rev. A. F. Fokes, Rev. A. A. Radley, Rev. R. M. Pounder, Rev. J. K. Curtis, Rev. W. G. A. Wilson, Rev. Thos. N. Brown, Rev. H. L. Morrison, Rev. S. P. Rose, Rev. S. E. Marshall. The examiners for the French course were elected as follows, Rev. C. D. Baldwin, Rev. T. Roy, Rev. L. Massicotte, Rev. P. Villard, Rev. W. Howitt, Rev. W. T. Halpenny, Rev. J. Pinel, Rev. L. M. England and Rev. L. E. Roy.

The president of the conference, Rev. C. D. Baldwin, and Rev. T. E. Holling were appointed to the board of Albert College.

A resolution regarding the superannuation fund was passed by the conference to the effect that in the case of church union the superannuation fund of the church to which all Methodist ministers are required to contribute will be so guarded that the rights of the claimant and prospective claimants be protected. The superannuation fund through its secretary, Rev. T. P. Shaver, reported showing that every circuit and minister had met his appropriation in full.

A report of the committee appointed to divide the funds of the Brock street church was brought in stating that the division was in the proportion of \$14,000 to Queen street and the remainder of the \$21,000 realized from the sale, to Princess street church.

The report caused an hour's discussion and finally the committee was asked to review its action and consult with three men appointed from each of the official boards of the Methodist churches of the city to determine if the committee was fulfilling its duties of dividing the funds in the best interests of Methodism in the city. The needs of Princess street as well as the Queen street church were expressed and while the conference realized that the committee had been granted to full powers to act yet it wished that the subject be considered again as some of the delegates were doubtful if the division of the funds was in the best interests of Methodism. Among the speakers on the subject were Rev. Thomas Brown, Rev. W. S. Lennon, Rev. R. H. Bell, Rev. J. D. Ellis and Rev. J. Webster.

The stationing committee in its report drew to the attention of the conference the appeal of several circuits in Quebec which were receiving no ministry. The appeal will be considered. The recommendation of the committee to superannuate Rev. E. W. Crane and J. A. Miller was granted.

Rolph Emery, Bagot street, will leave in a day or two for Vancouver, B.C., whence he sails on June 29th, having received the appointment of junior trade commissioner at Shanghai, China. Mr. Emery graduated with honors from Queen's University in 1921. He served overseas in the infantry with the rank of Lieutenant. Mr. Emery expects to be in China for a year at least.

Mr. Macfarlane stopped off at Quebec, Montreal, Glengarry, Kingston, and will pay a brief visit to Toronto, before going on to Winnipeg.

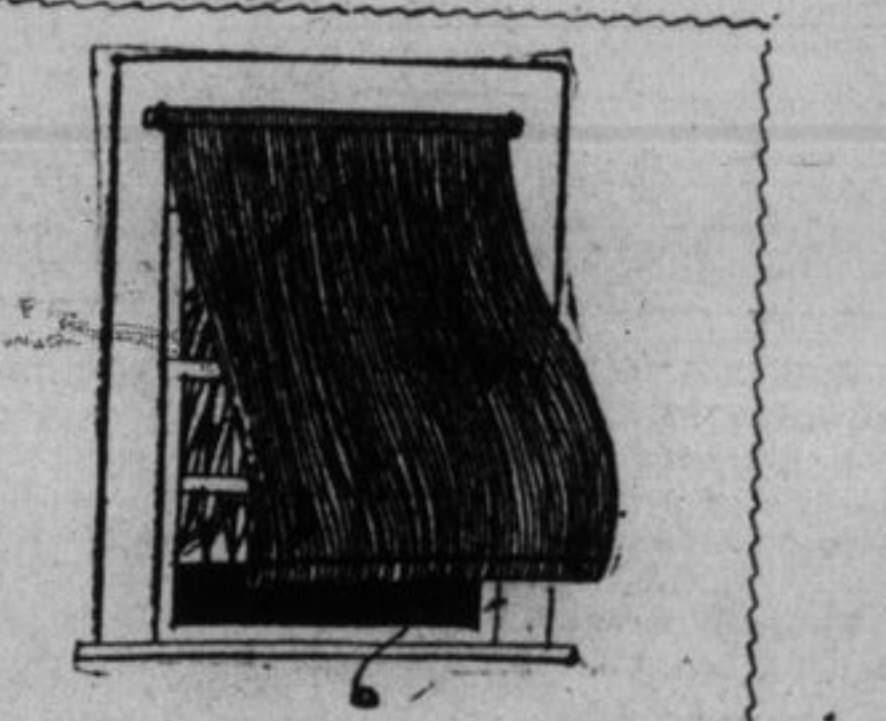
