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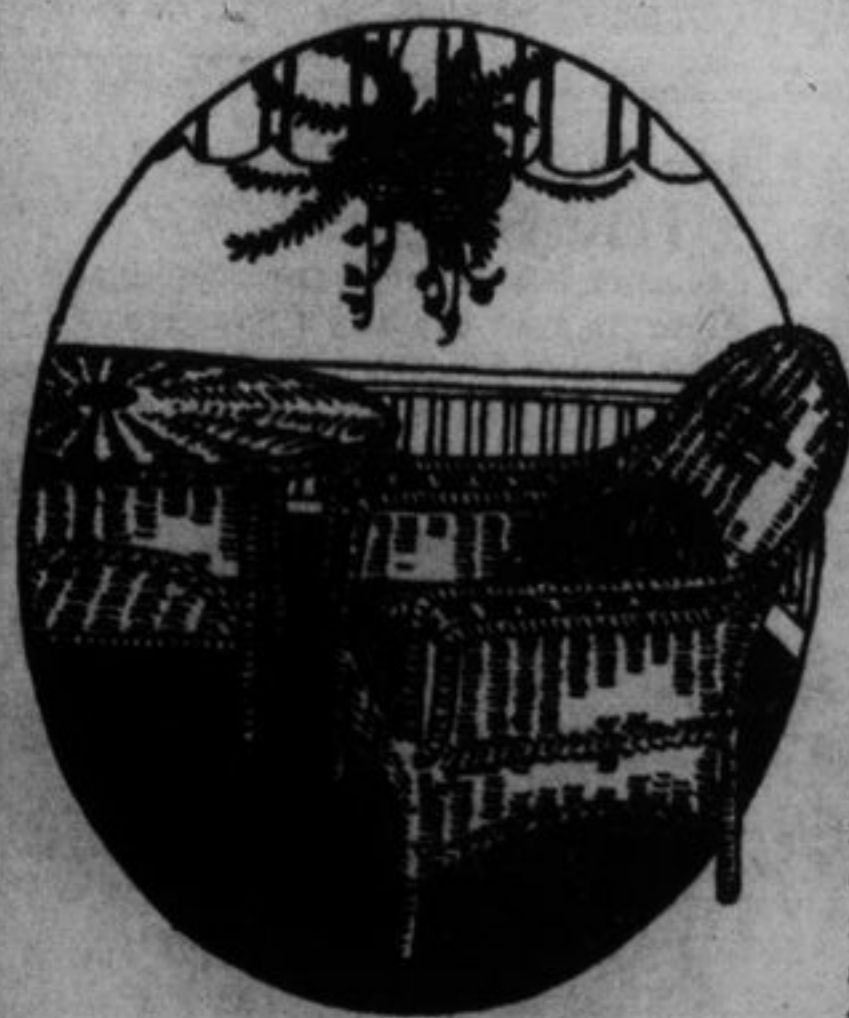

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THE QUEEN'S MEDICAL CONVOCATION CEREMONY

Dr. A. E. Ross, M.P., Addressed Graduates on Relation to State.

Principal Dr. Bruce Taylor presided over the proceedings of Queen's Medical College Convocation in Convocation hall, on Wednesday afternoon, and conferred the degrees on the forty-seven graduates. An audience that filled the hall to capacity, was present for the ceremonies. Rev. Dr. Malcolm Macgillivray conducted the devotional exercise and the graduates were addressed by Dr. A. E. Ross, M.P. Dean Connell also delivered a short address before presenting the graduates for their degrees. Rev. Dr. Daniel Gordon was present for the ceremonies, the members of the medical staff being on the platform. The graduates occupied the front seats, and were warmly applauded as they marched to the platform to receive their honors.

Dr. A. R. B. Williamson presented the prize winners, and Principal Taylor made the presentations. In his address, Dean Connell stated that all is well in the medical school. He paid a warm tribute to the members of the graduating class, and at the same time praised the work of the medical staff. He remarked that this convocation marking the close of the 60th session of the medical school. He also stated that the trustees had made provision for the appointment of a professor for preventive medicine in public health. The speaker declared that preventive medicine is the medicine of the future. It will have to do with the prevention and spread of disease, its cause, and means for bringing it under control.

Dean Connell gave the graduates some timely advice, in which he advised them to form good fellowship with their fellow doctors.

Dr. A. E. Ross, M.P., rector of the university, addressed the graduates on their relation to the state. He first dealt with the work in the hospitals. Too often, he said, people got the idea that hospitals had reached an ideal state. The history of hospitals showed them to be very old institutions. The speaker appealed to

the graduates to give their attention to the hospitals, as their development depended very largely on the work of the doctors. The hospitals of today served as the centres of social service and the doctors showed their influence toward the state through the hospitals. The work in the hospitals was carried on largely through the nurses.

"Your work towards the community in which you live, and the state, must be aided by the nursing profession, and the more interest you take and the more aid you give to the nursing profession, the greater will be your work towards the state and the people at large.

"And then you must take an interest in public health. We have not always stood for the benefit of the public. There is a wide field open for you along these lines, and you must exert your influence along the line of welfare.

"Then too, as a profession, we have not been strong on opinions in defining what should be done. There is the important question of child criminals. We are simply drifting along, with no segregation of children from the hardened criminals. There is also the problem of the 'unfinished man.' There is something at fault. Our institutions are filled to overflowing. We, as medical men, should be ever ready to express our opinion, and advise as to how things can be remedied. Then there is the question of dealing with the immigration. Little is being done at the present time, to prevent the immigrant coming here who will be a menace to the country. As a profession, we should take a strong stand.

"Every man in medicine should do all he possibly can for the preservation and development of the race. The war has robbed us of our very best blood. We must do all we can to develop the children and see to it that they get every chance to grow up and be healthy. Great things can be done by the medical profession. But all this work must not be taken up in a haphazard manner. Every graduating doctor could find some child in whom he can take a special interest and see to it that this child improves from his defects.

Here the speaker referred to doctors dealing out liquor prescriptions. "We have been made script vendors for the government liquor sellers without one objection," he said. "To me this is lowering the medical profession.

"We are to-day, idly standing by as a medical profession, watching the introduction of certain 'isms' coming in for the treatment of mankind. If we fall down we should not have any criticism, but if we put forth our faith in the training we have received, we will issue a challenge and open our hospitals for the treatment of our patients. We will stand on an equal footing and dictate who has the knowledge and truth.

Dr. Ross appealed to the graduates to keep up with the new development in their work, stating that if they did not do this, they would fall down, pointing out that conditions of living had made a change in conditions.

Principal Taylor also addressed the students briefly giving them some good advice. Rev. Dr. Macgillivray pronounced the benediction, the National Anthem was sung, and the proceedings were brought to a close.

SUPERVISE HOTELS IN SMALL CENTRES

Raney Says That a Committee Will Look Into the Situation.

Toronto, June 8.—Steps on the part of the government to supervise hotels in the smaller urban centres of the province were forecast by Hon. W. E. Raney, in the legislature. The attorney-general stated that many complaints had been received and that accommodation was not always of the best. Although he admitted that the situation was a difficult one to handle, he thought there should be some means whereby the government could require the hotels to come up to a reasonable standard in the interests of the general public. With the co-operation of the opposition parties the government intended to appoint a committee to investigate the matter during the recess, he said.

When the university estimates came up for consideration, Hon. G. H. Ferguson and W. F. Nickle, K.C., Kingston, urged upon the government the advisability of arriving at some system whereby the amounts of the annual grants to the three universities of the province could be fixed over a period of years. Hon. R. H. Grant agreed that such a method would make life more agreeable to the minister of education and promised to consider the suggestion.

Hon. Mr. Ferguson, supported by Thomas Marshall, Liberal, Lincoln, advocated the creation of industrial research departments in connection with the universities. Mr. Ferguson felt that such a step would aid in the bringing of the universities into closer contact with the non-academic world. H. A. Stevenson, London, maintained that, if properly organized and conducted, research departments could be made self-sustaining. The minister promised to look into the matter.

Degree for Stefansson.

Iowa City, Ia., June 8.—Vilhjalmur Stefansson, explorer of the frozen north, discoverer of a race of blonde Eskimos and famous alumnus of the University of Iowa, was awarded an honorary degree of LL.D. at the 1922 graduating exercises of the university today.
