The figures are more than life size and on the base is inscribed the following words: "To commemorate those in the service of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company who, at the call of King and Country, left all that was dear to them, endured hardship, faced danger and finally passed out of sight of men by the path of duty and self-sacrifice, giving up their own lives that others might live in freedom. Let these that come after see to it that their names be not forgotten. 1914-1918." Replicas of this statue will also stand in Winnipeg and Vancouver.
