



A VACUUM TUBE RECEIVER REQUIRING NO PLATE

BATTERY. While plate or, as they are popularly cilled, "B" batteries ordinarily last a long time in service and usually give little trouble, they do occupy space. In addition to requiring no such batteries for operation, the usual storage battery may be replaced by four common dry cells when the receiving set illustrated is used. Wh n the filament of the special vacuum tube is lighted by current from the dry cells, no filament rheostat is necessary. The dry sills vill last for several months with normal operation. They are preferably of the high amperage, ignit'on type of cell. A storage battery may be used instead of dry cells, but a rheostat is then required. The vacuum tube, which is probably the most important departure

from the customar, has a magnetic field across it which is furnished by a permanel, horseshoe magnet mounted on the under side of the panel directly beneath it. The tube can be adjusted for maximum signal strength by turning it in its holder and by adjusting a small armature directly above it. These adjustmet regulate the magnetic field and its effect upon the electrons emitted by the filament. The electron stream can be directed and controlled within the tube. Adjustments are, however, unnecessary unless quite distant signals are to be received.

The circuit used is non-regenerative and yet is very selective since tuning is not only a complished by varying the inductance of a variometer, but by also tuning the tube when necessary, There is only one tuning knob to control the circuit tuning, thus simplifying the ordinary adjustment for resonance. The variometer has a zigzag winding on non-warping forms. Resistance losses are low because of the silk covered litzendraht wire used, and the external field of the variometer coils is very weak and always in only one direction. The ratio of maximum to minimum inductance is very large, and the receiver will cover wave lengths from about 200 to 1,000 meters. If longer wave lengths are to be received a loading coil is furnished for the purpose. The loading coil will permit of reception up to and a little above 2,500 meters.
