Of the Irish Constitution—Churchill Postpones Statement Until Thursday.
London, June 13.—Winston Churchill announced in Commons yesterday afternoon that unexpected developments in negotiations over the Irish constitution make it necessary for him to defer his expected statement on the position until tomorrow or possibly Thursday.

MODIFICATIONS IN BUDGET

As Announced by the Finance Minister to the House of Commons.

Ottawa, June 13.—The finance minister amended the Inland Revenue Act on cigarettes, which he made \$9 per thousand in his May 23 Budget, and are now down to \$7.50 per thousand.

The stamp tax is changed. The new tax is two cents on every cheque or express order for \$50 and units of \$50 up to \$5,000, so that in no case can this stamp exceed a total of \$3.

Bonds, Stocks and Receipts.
In the case of stock transfers the May 23 Budget imposed a tax of five cents a share. This tax has been cut to three cents.

Confectionery and Drinks.
The tax on confectionery is changed. The new clause reads: "Confectionery which may be classed as candy or a substitute for candy, but not to include goods packed ready for sale in cartons or other packages bearing the name of the manufacturer, selling by retail at 10 cents or less per carton, nor to include candy known as gross goods, selling by retail at one cent, 5 per cent."

New Tax on Cigars.
The new tax on cigars is as follows:
(a) Valued at not more than \$40 per thousand—per thousand, 50 cents.

Depreciated Currency.
