SUFFERED DISLOCATION OF BOTH HIS SHOULDERS

H. Kerns, Joyceville, Was Thrown From Wagon at Kingston Mills.

H. Kerns, Joyceville was the victim of a very serious and painful accident while driving to the city on Tuesday morning, when he was thrown from his wagon and had both shoulders dislocated, his head and face cut and bruised and a rib injured. He is confined to bed at the Hotel Dieu.

Mr. Kerns is a farmer and he started from home in the morning in his wagon drawn by a team of horses to get a load of lumber. Approaching Kingston Mills his horses became frightened at the whistle of a passing train and bolted. He was thrown from the wagon with great force, and when discovered by another farmer was in a helpless condition. He was conveyed to the Hotel Dieu where the dislocated shoulders were reset.

Sent Up For Trial For Breaking Jail

Fred Johnson, who was on Monday morning arrested on the provincial highway for breaking jail at Napanee a year ago, after being arrested on charge of theft, appeared before the court at Napanee Tuesday morning, and was committed to stand trial next week. He will probably appear before Judge Madden, who is this week presiding at the local county court.

For theft at Northbrook, Joseph H. Ferris appeared before Judge J. L. Floyd of that place on Monday and was committed for trial. He will appear at the same time as Johnson. The grand jury brought in a true bill against Dr. A. W. Richardson.

Four Criminal Cases Go to Grand Jury

The County Court and Court of the General Sessions opened at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon at the court house with Judge Madden on the bench. The grand jury was chosen and addressed by the judge. The four criminal cases on the docket were then turned over to the grand jury, which will probably be detained some time considering whether true bills can be returned. In the meantime, one of the civil cases will likely come up. There are three jury cases and five non-jury cases on the civil docket.

There was not a very large crowd on hand Tuesday afternoon, people apparently recognizing that the main sessions will not likely start before Wednesday morning.

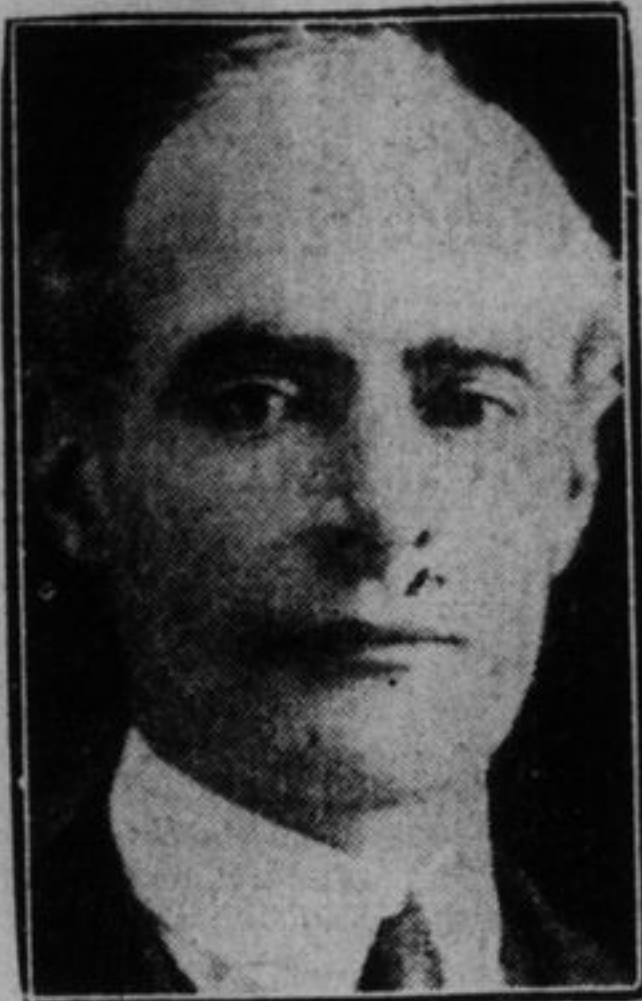
MEDICAL EXAMINERS.
