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THE NATIONAL COUNCIL OF WOMEN TO CONVENT

For Twenty-eighth Annual Meeting in Port Arthur Next Week.

The twenty-eighth annual meeting of the National Council of Women with a membership of 500,000 will be held from the 19th to the 28th of June, at Port Arthur and Port William. Founded in 1893 by the Marchioness of Aberdeen and Temair, the organization has continued to promote legislation which will improve conditions for women and children and has at present an able ally in Her Excellency, Lady Byng, the honorary president. Mrs. W. E. Sanford of Hamilton the national president, is this year retiring from office and those who have been nominated are Doctor Augusta Stowe Gullen, Toronto, Provincial vice-president of Ontario, and Miss C. E. Carmichael of New Glasgow, N.S., provincial vice-president of Nova Scotia.

Progress has marked the activities of the Council during the year and there are now 75 local Councils. Sudbury and Stratford were the latest to organize while another is in process of formation at Smith's Falls. The Council is now affiliated with the Daughters of the Empire, The Victorian Order of Nurses, The Canadian Women's Press Club, The Canadian Nursing Association, The King's Daughters, The W.C.T.U., The Women's Art Association, and recently the women of the Salvation Army have been received in Federation.

The speakers at the annual meeting will include Mrs. Sanford, who will give an account of the executive meeting of the International Council of Women, representing 20,000,000 members at the Hague in May; Dr. Augusta Stowe Gullen, who with Dr. Ritchie England of Montreal and Mrs. Atherton Smith of St. John, N.B., were the representatives of the National Council at the Pan-American conference of women voters at Baltimore, and Dr. Margaret Patterson, Toronto's first woman magistrate. Illustrated lectures will be presented by Miss Horton of New York state on "Correct Posture," by Mr. J. A. Wilson, secretary of the Air Board in Canada, on "Aviation in Canada," and by Hon. Mr. Ellis, Minister of Mines in Ontario, on "Semi-Precious Stones of Canada." Hon. S. J. Latta, Minister of Education, Sask., will speak on the "Education of the Foreign Born," Mrs. Dennis, Halifax, of the Canadian Council of Immigration and Mrs. C. H. Thorburn, Ottawa, convener of the committee on Immigration, will discuss that subject. Mrs. O. C. Edwards, MacLeod, Alta., will deal with the question of the protection of children of unmarried parents. Other speakers will be Alderman (Mrs.) Twidale of Niagara Falls, Mrs. Hannington of Ottawa of the Victorian Order of Nurses, Miss Frances Loring, Toronto sculptress and Miss Lucy Doyle, president of the Canadian Women's Press Club.

Entertainments have been arranged including a reception by Mayor and Mrs. Matthews, Port Arthur, a motor drive to Kabeoka Falls, a boat trip up to Silver Islet, a luncheon given by the Kwan's Club, a dinner by the Rotary Club, a banquet by the Women's Institute and other functions arranged by the West Algoma Local Council.

Having embraced an extensive platform based on their maxim of "Truth, Justice, Righteousness and Loyalty," The National Council propose to work towards the enactment of such legislation as will be necessary to insure these ideals. The council urges equal moral standards in public and private life, political equality for men and women, the open nomination of political candidates, the abolition of patronage and the naturalization of women independently of their husbands.

In regard to social questions, the platform urges uniform marriage laws, equality of cause for divorces, prohibition and raising the age of consent to 18 years. The industrial standards aim at equal pay for equal work; physical and mental fitness, regardless of sex, as the basis of employment; co-operation between employer and employees and collective bargaining as defined by the Federal department of Labor.

Tribute is paid to the great contribution made by the late Sir John Eaton to the industrial life of Canada in introducing and maintaining good industrial conditions among his employees. This is in a resolution of sympathy to Lady Eaton.

One recommendation which will be presented is embodied in a resolution from the Toronto Local Council of Women, of which Mrs. R. G. Smythe is president, requesting the establishment of a Family Court in all large cities.

Reports will be presented covering the activities of the sixteen standing committees on citizenship, conservation of natural resources, education, equal moral standard, fine and applied arts, household economics, immigration laws, mental hygiene, league of nations, professions and employments for women, public health, national reading union, national recreation, objectionable printed matter and films, taxation, while the subject of "housing" will come up for discussion.

Mrs. C. H. Thorburn, convener of Immigration, Ottawa, is retiring from office and those who have been nominated are: Mrs. Atherton Smith, of St. John, N.B., and Miss Charlotte Whitton, who is to be secretary at Ottawa with Hon. T. A. Low, minister without portfolio. Mrs. John McGillivray, Kingston, convener of objectionable printed

matter and films, is also resigning and nominations will be made at the meeting.

It has already been decided that the 1923 annual meeting will be held at Halifax, N.S.

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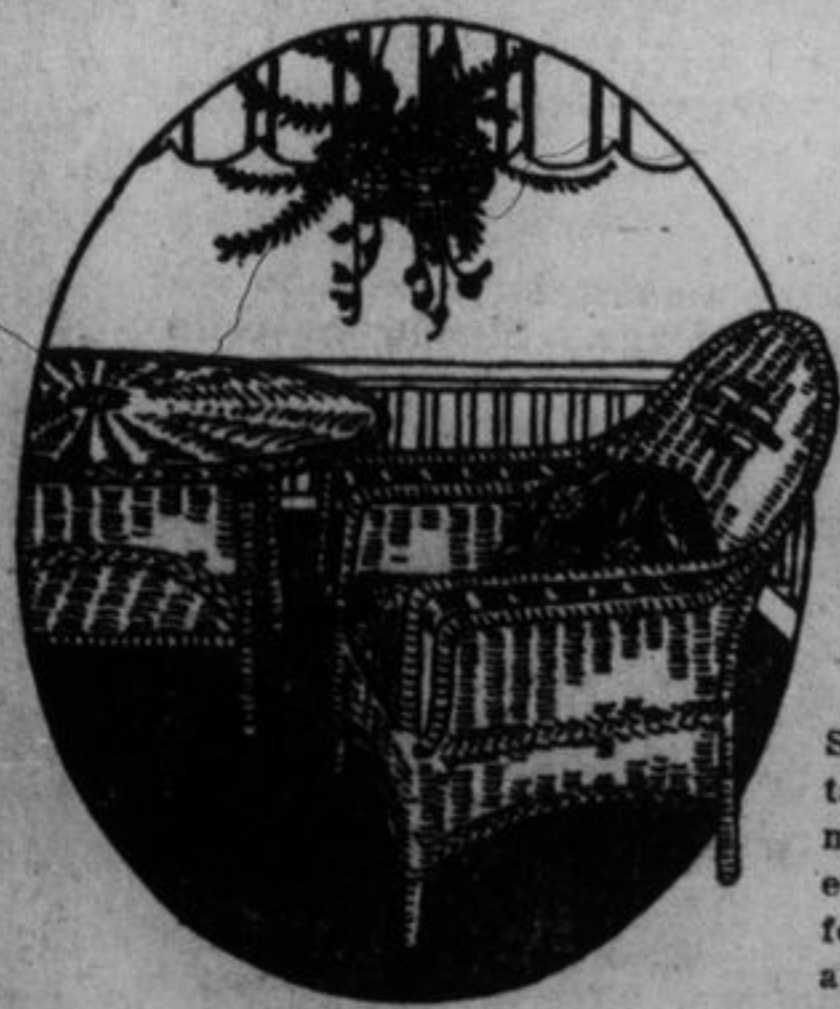
