Galveston, Texas, June 17.—A decision declaring that vessels flying the United States flag are United States territory and that the prohibition act is applicable thereto, was made in United States district court here about a month ago. It was recalled today in connection with the protest of Adolphus Busch, 3rd, against the practice of selling liquor on board vessels of the United States Shipping Board.

Judge J. C. Hutchison, Jr., held that a vessel flying the United States flag is United States territory, whether within the jurisdictional limits of the United States or not (including on the high seas and in foreign ports) that the prohibition act is applicable thereto and that the vessels may not be permitted to possess or sell intoxicating liquors.
