CO-OPERATIVE MARKETING

Dairymen Addressed at Elgin by Hon. Manning Doherty and Aaron Shapiro.

nrinister of agriculture, and Aaron large gathering of dairymen at Elgin on Friday afternoon on the subject of co-operative marketing of dairy products. The advantages of merchandising farm products were emphasized by Mr. Sapiro, who has attained an international fame as an expert in economics as applied agriculture, and has been very successful in organizing the cotton growers in the southern states. He advocated the adoption of a system of marketing that would enable the farmers to control and to place about 75 or 80 per cent, of their products on the markets as demands arose, and to avoid dumping their goods. one factory competing with another. thereby breaking prices. He plained the egg industry of California, telling how, after becoming a co-operative company, the producers were able to place only sufficient eggs on the market at one time to satisfy immediate requirements. Severty-five per cent, of the annua production of eggs is produced within the period of three and one-half months, so that the importance the system of control is apparent. By controlling the market supply, the producers realized eighteen cents lozen more for their eggs. Mr. Sapiro dealt exhaustively with

the history of co-operative companies and showed how failure was met by many. The real reason was the in ability to secure the control of sufficient of the products. When they obtained control of seventy-five per cent. of the product of the state they were able to succeed.

The advantage of government inspection and grading was shown by the speaker, who told of the development of the fruit industry in California. Once the government graded brands became known, the buyers had every confidence in them. "Sunkist" oranges, now famous wherever oranges are sold, was merely the brand of a co-operative company in the beginning.


