CO-OPERATIVE MARKETING

Dairymen Addressed at Elgin by Hon. Manning Doherty and Aaron Shapiro.

Hon. Manning Doherty, Ontario minister of agriculture, and Aaron Shapiro, San Francisco, addressed a large gathering of dairymen at Elgin on Friday afternoon on the subject of co-operative marketing of dairy products.

Mr. Shapiro dealt exhaustively with the history of co-operative companies and showed how failure was met by many. The real reason was the inability to secure the control of sufficient of the products.

The greatest enthusiasm was shown by the meeting and a committee was appointed consisting of one representative from each township in the county of Leeds to take immediate action with a view to organizing an Ontario-wide company.
