MORVICH LOSES 13TH.

Champion Three-Year-Old Finally Goes Down to Defeat.

Morvich, hailed as America's unbeatable three-year-old, was beaten in the Carlton stakes at the Aqueduct track, New York city on Saturday by Whiskaway, by three lengths. Whiskaway won the \$7,500 mile in an 1.3-6 2-5. Snob II. was third, five lengths back. Horologe also ran. June Grass and William A., were scratched. Whiskaway got off in front, and made every post a winning one, beating the marvel by three lengths at the finish, with Snob II. in the third place. It was Morvich's thirteenth start, and the hoodoo evidently spelled disaster, for it was his first defeat. The great son of Runnymede ran at a terrific pace in a workout yesterday, which may have affected his chances in the mile dash this afternoon, but considering the pull that Whiskaway had in the weights it was not a humiliating defeat. The big horse will, despite the loss, be shipped to Latonia for the great Latonia special to be run at that course next summer.

Matty keeps pretty much to himself. Now and then friends from New York come to see him, but not often. He has not made many acquaintances here. Critic States Willis Has Very Bad Pair of Hands

Harry Willis, New York, totes a bad pair of hands. This is not meant in the sense that they are ruinous to the first jaw they land on but that they are unsound. A critic of no slight reputation has examined the members in question, and according to his report, they are so badly mashed up from thumping numerous heads, mostly Ethiopian, as to be quite fragile. This is a most serious matter to a pugilist, particularly a hard punching heavyweight.

We have no doubt that there is more truth than claptrap about the report. The critic in question is above suspicion in the matter of judgment. If he says Willis' hands are inclined to be brittle, then write it down in the family bible that Willis' hands have not a thing in common with a concrete paving block. Such being the case, quite a different light is thrown upon the prospective Dempsey-Willis bout for the heavyweight championship, a bout that is bound to be held somewhere, some time. If Carpenter, a remarkable hitter with his right, was able to cross one twice to Dempsey's jaw in a single round without causing the champion to forsake the perpendicular, what chance has Willis, if his hands will not stand the punishment? That Willis hits harder than Carpenter only means that the strain on his hands will be that much greater.

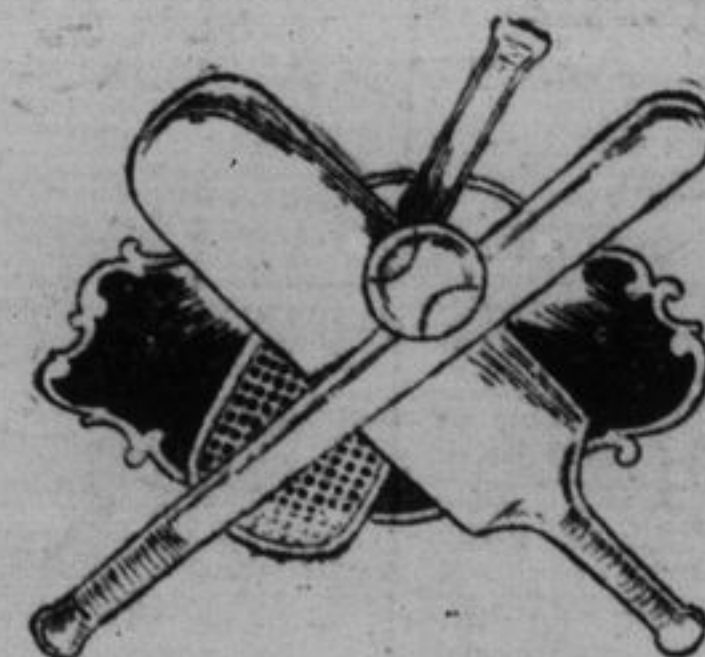
