MANY ORANGE DELEGATES ARRIVE FOR CONVENTION

The Ladies' Benevolent Association Convenes in St. James' Parish Hall.

The Grand Lodge Orange Black Chapter of British America opened at the Orange hall, Princess street on Monday afternoon at 3.30. Most Worshipful Sir Knight L. E. Stanley, Ottawa, presiding. There were about one hundred Black Knights in attendance among them being Hon. W. D. Macpherson and Joe Thompson, M.P.P. and H. C. Hocken, M.P., Toronto.

The opening of the session was confined to the transaction of routine business, including the filing of credentials and the appointment of committees.

At 5 p.m. Mayor S. S. Corbett gave an address of welcome on behalf of the city, and extended an invitation to the members to visit the city buildings and the memorial hall which many did during the evening after the session of the city council.

In the evening the advisory committee held a conference over the business to be laid before the session which opened this morning when the committees brought in their reports and the grand master and secretary-treasurer presented their annual reports. The deliberations are expected to be concluded this evening.

Today the Grand Lodge Orange Ladies Benevolent Association met in St. James' parish hall and there was a large attendance of delegates from the ladies' lodges.

Delegates to the Grand Orange Lodge of British America continue to arrive in the city on all trains today and it is expected that there will be six hundred present when the 92nd annual session opens tomorrow with Grand Master H. C. Hocken in the chair.

The Orangemen will be entertained while in the city by a special committee by the local lodges composed of W. J. Saunders, chairman, H. C. Wood, H. A. Graham, T. A. Kidd, James Berry, Mrs. Hussey, Mrs. Cassels. One of the features will be a trip among the Thousand Islands on Wednesday evening.

The Ladies Orange Benevolent Association of British America opened in St. James' Parish hall at 2 p.m. and there was an attendance of 150 delegates from all over the Dominion. Most Worshipful Grand Mistress, Mrs. Flora Burrows, Hamilton, presided and gave an address of welcome. Reports were presented and after the appointment of committees only routine business was proceeded with. On Wednesday the committees will report and the Most Worshipful the Grand Mistress will present her annual report. The remainder of the programme will be dealt with, including the election of grand officers and selecting the place of meeting next year. The other officers are: Most Worshipful Deputy Grand Mistress, Mrs. H. Flandera, Plaster Rock; Most Worshipful Grand Mistress, Miss Cullen, Toronto; grand treasurer; Most Worshipful Grand Mistress, Mrs. Jean Gordon, Toronto, grand secretary.

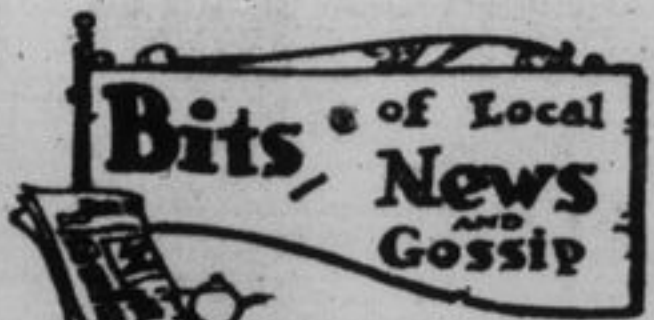

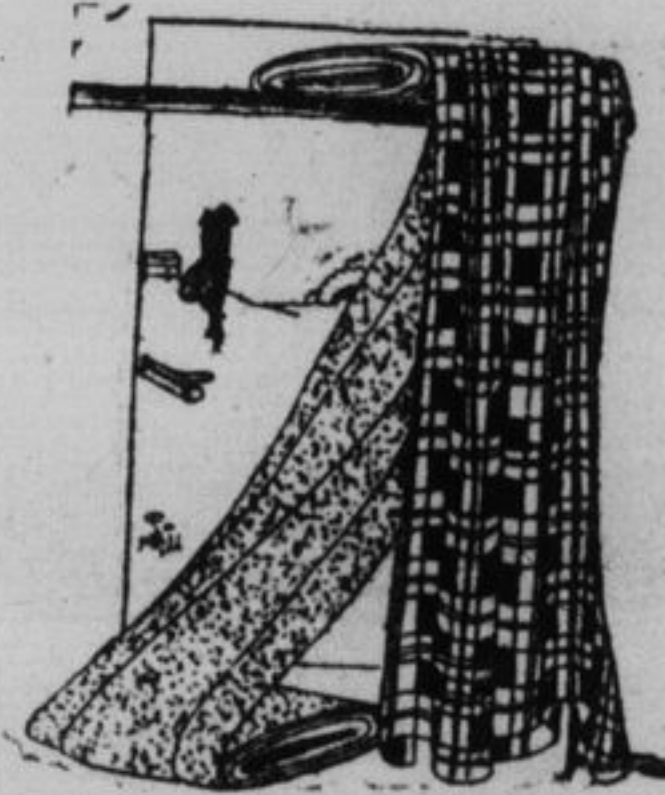
