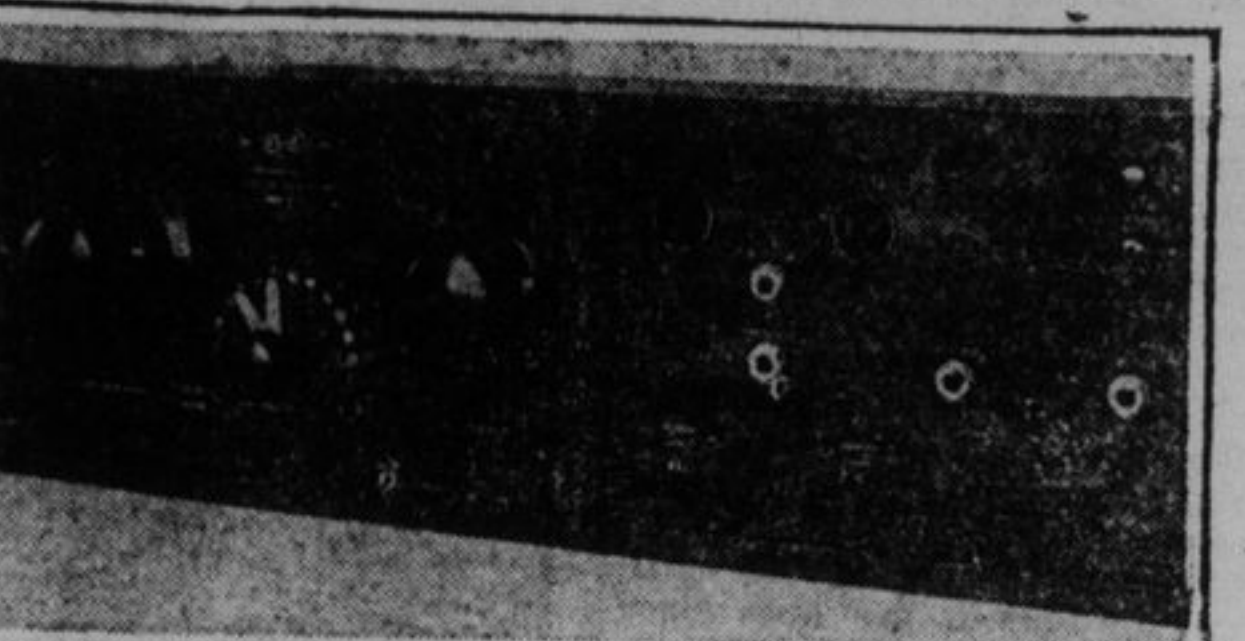

APPARATUS AND DEVICES

AN EFFICIENT AND WELL MADE REGENERATIVE RECEIVER.

Although enabling a wave length range of from 150 to 3,000 meters, the regenerative receiver illustrated is very compact and comprises a two stage audio frequency amplifier, in addition to the receiver and vacuum tube detector.



on the extreme left controls the capacity of an antenna series condenser. The two bladed switch next to it controls the grid inductance and provides for eliminating the effect of the unused turns of the coil.

between the rotor and stator turns. Up in the right hand corner are two binding posts for a loud speaker, so that it may be left connected. When it is desired to use the loud speaker and cut off the head telephones it is only necessary to slide the plug a little way out of the jack.

When the plug is pushed all the way in the loud speaker is disconnected. Aluminum screens are mounted in back of the panel where necessary to eliminate the detuning effects of "body capacity." All connections for "A" and "B" batteries are made through the rear of the cabinet.

This receiver has many little refinements, such as tapered knobs and binding posts, rubber adjustment of condenser capacity, tickler coupling and tube rheostat. There are no heating contacts anywhere in the receiver when hand used. Instead for making such connections, the wiring is very rigid except where it is necessary in making connections.
