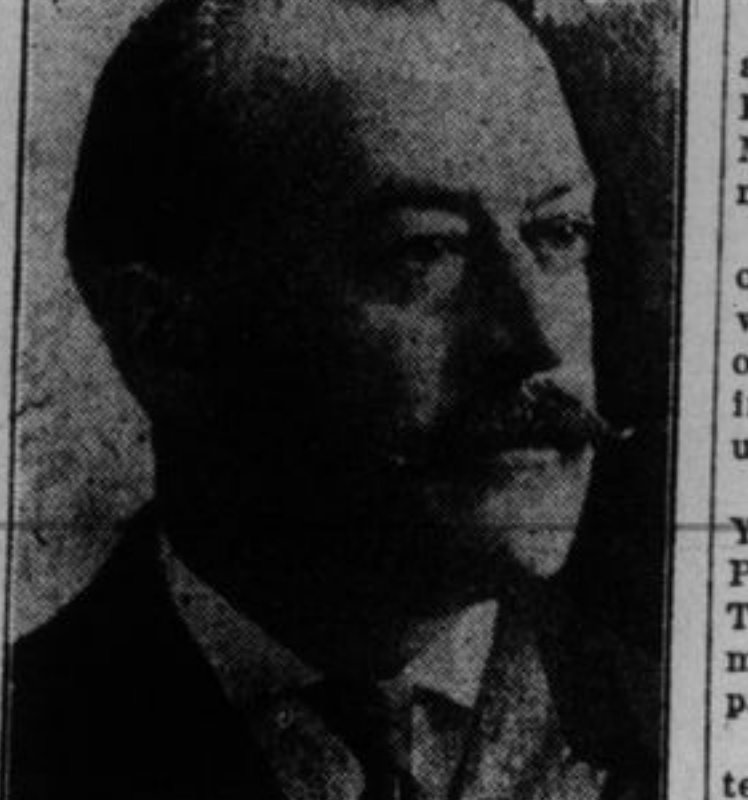

GRAND ORANGE LODGE RESUMED WORK

A Full Programme Was Maped Out—Had Pleasant Water Trip.

The Grand Orange Lodge resumed its sessions this morning with Grand Master H. C. Hocken, and Deputy Grand Master McPherson presiding alternately. The programme today includes routine work, the discussion of proposed amendments to the constitution and the preparation of resolutions for presentation to the various committees that have yet to present reports.

It is hardly likely that the election of officers will take place before Friday. The selection of Hon' W. D. McPherson as grand master leaves the real interest of the delegates centred upon the election of the de-

puty grand master. There are ten candidates for election to this office, composed of the provincial grand masters, of whom Hon. J. W. Edwards, grand master for Ontario East, is regarded as a strong possibility. Some, however, favor the selection of a deputy grand master from one of the other provinces in the interest of the Orange Order, Ontario having for the past four years held a dominant position. Outside delegates feel that as Ontario still holds the office of grand master, the office of deputy grand master should be held by an outside man. Hon. Dr. Edwards, however, during the past six months worked indefatigably as supreme organizer, and has been before nearly all lodges in the province. His election would be only due recognition of his services in the recent campaign. He is, therefore, assured of the support of the solid Ontario vote.

On Wednesday evening the delegates took the delightful trip down the river on the fine steamer Waubic and express their unbounded enthusiasm over it. They were simply enchanted by the scenery and enjoyed every moment.

Mayor Corbett addressed the Orange Ladies' Benevolent Association at St. James' Parish hall at 10 a.m., today, and conveyed the greetings of the city to the visitors. He expressed great pleasure over the honor brought to Kingston by the annual convention of the Orange Order and expressed the hope that here the visitors who were peculiarly interested in the places of historic importance might find time to visit the buildings and other places in the city that are held in veneration by Canadians everywhere. He directed attention to the memorial hall and Queen's University, Fort Henry, Tete de Pont Barracks and the Royal Military College, all made famous by the men who have passed through them into the public, military and professional life of Canada.

Most Worshipful Mistress, Mrs. Burrows, replied to the mayor and thanked him for his great kindness in coming to address them. She told of the ladies' great appreciation of the privilege to take the St. Lawrence river trip last evening, one that will always be remembered by her.
