Edgar Rowson was occupying the back seat when the train crashed into the car, and it was only by a miracle that he was not killed. When the train was brought to a stop the engineer found Rowson on the pilot of the engine, being held there by his clothing. Rowson's left thigh is broken, his shoulder severely crushed, and his face and head is a mass of cuts. In order to dress the wounds it was cessary to shave his bead, the wounds being deeply imbedded.
