

FINE LEVIED ON DOCTOR

For Breach of O.T.A. Prescription Rules.

A Provincial Inspector Swore That He Got Two Prescriptions.

In the police court on Friday morning, Dr. W. McCarthy, of this city, faced two charges, of having unlawfully issued prescriptions to enable parties securing the said prescriptions to evade the provisions of the Ontario Temperance Act.

The first charge was demitted, and on the second the doctor was found guilty and fined \$100 and costs, or one month.

Government inspectors told about going to Dr. McCarthy's office and being given prescriptions.

James S. Jones, employed as an inspector under the O.T.A., gave evidence. He said he was in Dr. McCarthy's office about 10.45 Thursday morning.

Witness said that afterwards he asked Dr. McCarthy for a prescription for a friend he had.

Witness declared that he got the second order for his friend, giving the name of his friend, and that he paid \$2 to the doctor.

Witness identified two prescriptions as those issued by the doctor. Witness said that he never told the doctor he was sick, or had an ailment.

Witness also stated that every prescription issued by Dr. McCarthy had to be accompanied by an affidavit before the order could be filled by the vendor.

Mr. Shea remarked that there was a great mix-up in names in the case. The previous witness had given two wrong names to the doctor, and he wanted to know if the witness was instructed to give wrong names, whereupon the witness said, "no."

Called Spotter and Objected. Mr. Shea used the word "spotter," in continuing his questions, and the witness objected very strongly, stating that he was engaged as an inspector of government dispensaries.

Stanley Robert Marshall, a provincial constable, who accompanied the first officer, who gave evidence, swore that he got an order from the doctor. Witness told the doctor that he was attending the convention here. Witness did not say as was ill.

WILD GALE IN WEST

A Hurricane Swept Through Winnipeg.

The Blow Came Early in the Morning And Caused Much Damage.

Winnipeg, June 23.—A hurricane struck Winnipeg about four o'clock this morning and left in its wake a great number of uprooted trees and broken branches, unroofed houses, dismantled billboards and tumbled chimneys.

While the wind was at its height telegraph poles and wires were carried down in sufficient numbers to sever communication east, west and south and it was not possible this morning to ascertain the extent of the storm.

A boy was killed when he grabbed a live wire which had been blown to the ground. His name is not known. Four persons are in the hospital with injuries received in various ways during the storm.

Of Field Marshal Sir Henry Wilson. British House of Commons Adjourned As a Tribute of Respect.

London, June 23.—News of the assassination of Field Marshal Wilson yesterday quickly spread through the House of Commons. William Sutherland communicated it to Prime Minister Lloyd George and Colonial Secretary Churchill.

WAS I. R. A. MAN

London, June 23.—It was stated at Scotland Yard last evening that correspondence had been found in possession of James Connolly, one of the men arrested for the murder of Field Marshal Wilson, proving beyond a doubt that he was a member of the Irish Republican army.

Story of the Murder

London, June 23.—An eye-witness to the tragedy told the United Press the following story of the shooting: "I was in the neighborhood of Eaton Place and heard shots ring out. I looked just in time to see two armed men pumping bullets from their revolvers into the body of Sir Henry. When I reached him, his head, legs and chest were literally riddled with bullets."

Manitoba Election, July 21st.

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RAIDS YIELD 16 ARRESTS

In Connection With Wilson Assassination. A Conspiracy Disclosed to Take Lives of Prominent Persons.

London, June 23.—Fifteen men and one woman were arrested in raids throughout London last night in connection with the assassination of Field Marshal Sir Henry Wilson, it was announced in the House of Commons this morning by Lord Chancellor Chamberlain.

Considering Action

London, June 23.—There was unusually large attendance at the House of Commons this morning in connection with the Wilson assassination. Mr. Lloyd George was not present and his absence was the source of some complaint but Austen Chamberlain, government leader, explained that the premier was conferring with the authorities regarding steps to be taken in the situation.

Radio Searchlight Will Penetrate 100 Miles

New York, June 23.—A radio searchlight which will cut the rough fog and darkness for a distance of 100 miles and rob the sea of its terrors is the momentous announcement made here by Guglielmo Marconi.

He said that by means of his radio searchlight, which can be reflected like light waves, he can send in a given distance in one great beam a huge light that otherwise would be scattered to all points of the compass.
