NEGOTIATIONS NOT CARRIED ON OFFICIALLY For Control of Canadian Locomotive Stock to Baldwin.

The financial Post of Toronto says: While Samuel M. Vaucian, president of the Baldwin Locomotive Works, the gigantic United States concern manufacturing railway traction equipment, has denied that his company is seeking control of the Canadian Locomotive Company there is still a possibility that a measure of control in the Canadian company may shift to interests closely associated with the American enterprise.

The Canadian directors of the Canadian Locomotive state that there have been no negotiations whatever between the company and other interests tending to a change of control. But it is known that a certain block of stock of unnamed proportions has been taken under option by American interests. The negotiations have been entirely of a private character between individuals and conversely private holdings. They have not been carried out by the Canadian company officially. No transfer has as yet taken place, but the options it is understood, still hold.
