## PROVOKED DISCUSSION.

Radio May Oust Movies Inside of Six Months.

At Port Arthur at Thursday's session of the convention of the National Council of Women the report of the Committee on Objectionable Printed Matter and films written by Mrs. J. Macgillivray, Kingston, provoked a lengthy discussion. One suggestion was that the ban on Hearst publications be followed up by women refusing to buy any matter published by this company. Mrs. E. M. Murray declared a ban is of no effect so long as Canadian women continue to buy them.

Mrs. Macgillivray's report referred extensively to objectionable literature which was dealt with by the committee. Many large Canadian cities have improved the conditions in regard to moving picture entertainments and Montreal, Kingston and a few other cities have special films for children. A discussion of great interest opened with the suggestion that radio be added to the field of the Committee on Objectionable Printed Matter and Films. Mrs. Twidale, of Niagara Falls, suggested that radio may oust movies from their popular place in another six months.

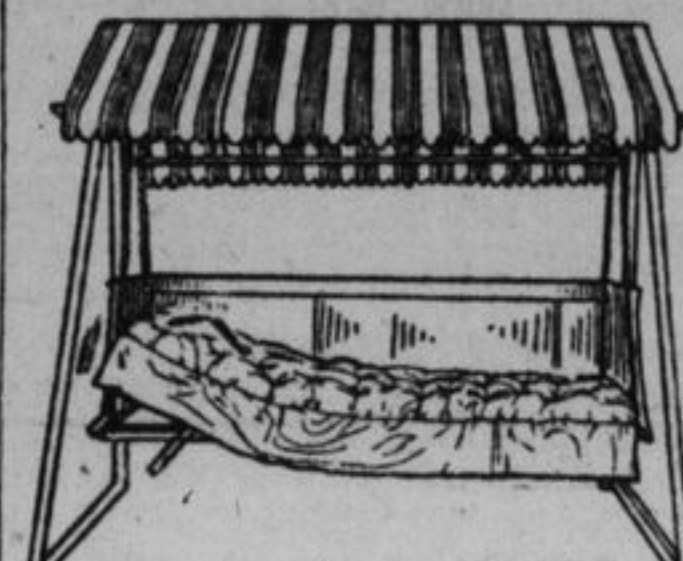

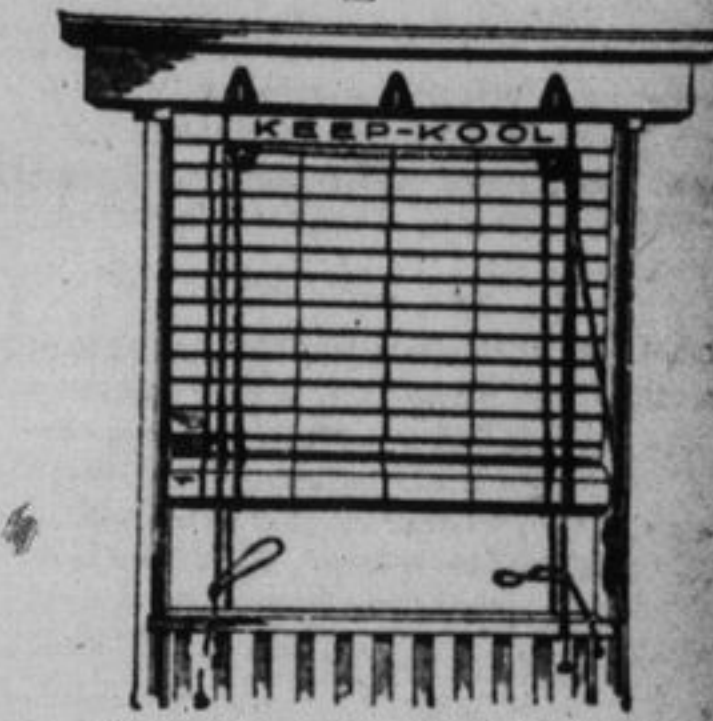
