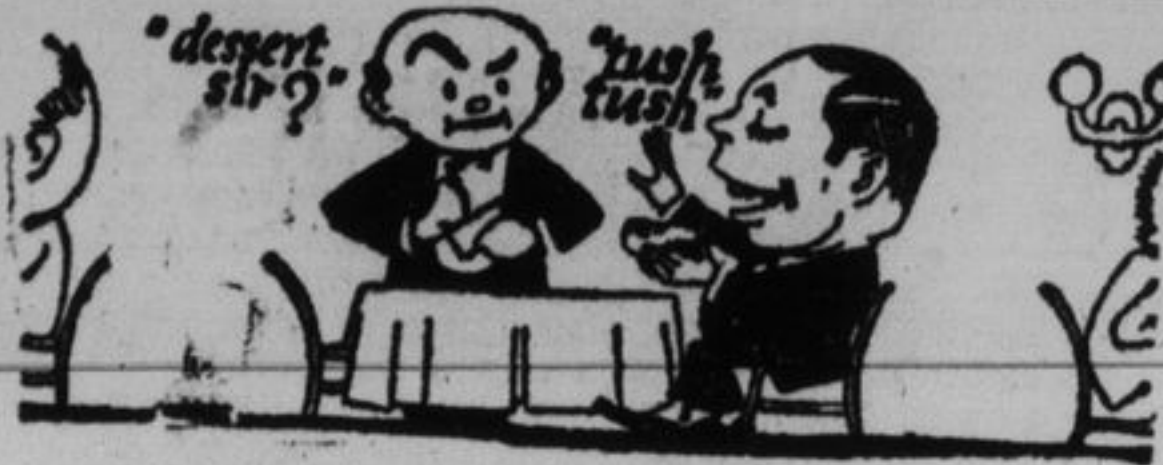

PROVINCIAL HIGHWAY OILED AND SANDED

The Roads Will Soon Be Ready and Travel Will Be Pleasant.

The provincial highway, east and west of the city, is this week being oiled and sanded. The stretch of nine and one-half miles east of the city to the "Finger Board" was started last week and already three miles at the Kingston end has been completed, and soon will be fit for travel. This part, which was completed and oiled for the first time since last summer, is being treated with tarvia B. while the newer section farther east is getting done with the primary treatment. The work is being done by the Law Construction Company, Toronto, under the supervision of H. A. Small, resident engineer.

As one of the necessary parts of the treatment is that the oil must be given time to soak in the motorists are advised to give this road a rest for a few weeks as the middle road to Gananoque may be used. This is also to the motorists' benefit as the oil is not ideal for travelling over.

The road from Barrie to Kingston Mills is also under reconstruction for the Ottawa highway, and hence motorists going to the east are advised that the best road to use would be Montreal street, to Kingston Mills and then getting to the middle road.

The oiling of the road from Cataraqui to Kingston is being done by the provincial department, and was started Monday. The huge oiling machine is doing one half of the road at a time so that traffic may use the other side.
