

PRICES OF FOOD TO BE LOWERED

By Passing of the Freight Rates Report in the Commons.

Ottawa, June 27.—Shortly after 11 o'clock last night the bill suspending the Crow's Nest Pass agreement on freight rates for one year, except on grain and flour, was given its third reading.

The report of the special house committee was brought down first thing yesterday afternoon by the chairman, Hon. A. K. Maclean.

During the vote on Sir Henry Drayton's amendment there was some excitement. William German (Welland), who was the only member opposed to the committee report, voted for the amendment.

There was great cheering when E. M. Macdonald, Hon. Walter Mitchell and Joseph Archambault, all members of the committee, and all of whom supported the railway contention for some weeks, voted with the government.

The bill now goes to the Senate. The upper house could kill it, but if the bill is killed the entire Crow's Nest rate of rates will automatically come into effect on July 7th next.

This will be kept well in view by the senators.
