**QUEEN'S NOT BECOMING ACADEMY FOR DANCING**

Folk and Interpretive Dancing Instruction Part of Physical Training Course.

The announcement by Queen's summer school staff that dancing would be one of the subjects added to the curriculum of the school has been given considerable publicity, creating the impression that this is an entirely new departure for Queen's, while, in reality, the director of the school, Prof. MacClement, explains, similar instruction has been on the calendar of both the summer and regular sessions of the college for some years.

The course is not given merely for the teaching of dancing in itself but as a part of the physical culture training. Other years folk dancing was taught as part of the Strathcona course and was taken by the teachers as an aid in their physical training work in the collegiates and high schools of the province. It is a well known fact to those who are in the least acquainted with Queen's that the lady instructors at the fall and winter sessions have given instruction in folk dancing as a regular part of the physical training course and in certain instances interpretative dancing has been taught. A few years ago the whole class took the latter course, while this last session, several co-eds gave a demonstration at the university theatre night. The ball room dancing, which Miss Dickson is also announced to instruct the teachers in, is a side issue in the general idea of the course, as one designed to aid in the physical training of the teachers and divert them from too much study, which the staff of the summer-school find the students inclined to do.

So that if Queen's is digressing from her traditions, as some would insinuate, the former Presbyterian college has been on the down grade for some years. Dances have always been a feature of the life of the winter students but strict regulations call for but three principal dances in the year, those the faculty events, and also smaller dances, usually run by the years societies, of which there may be but one each week. There were not as many dances last year as some years previously and the prospects are that next year, due to a proposed increased rental of the Grant hall, the number may be still further decreased. These restrictions are all agreed to by the student governing body—the alma mater society. So that, with its students at least, Queen's is not gaining the unenviable reputation of becoming a dancing academy.

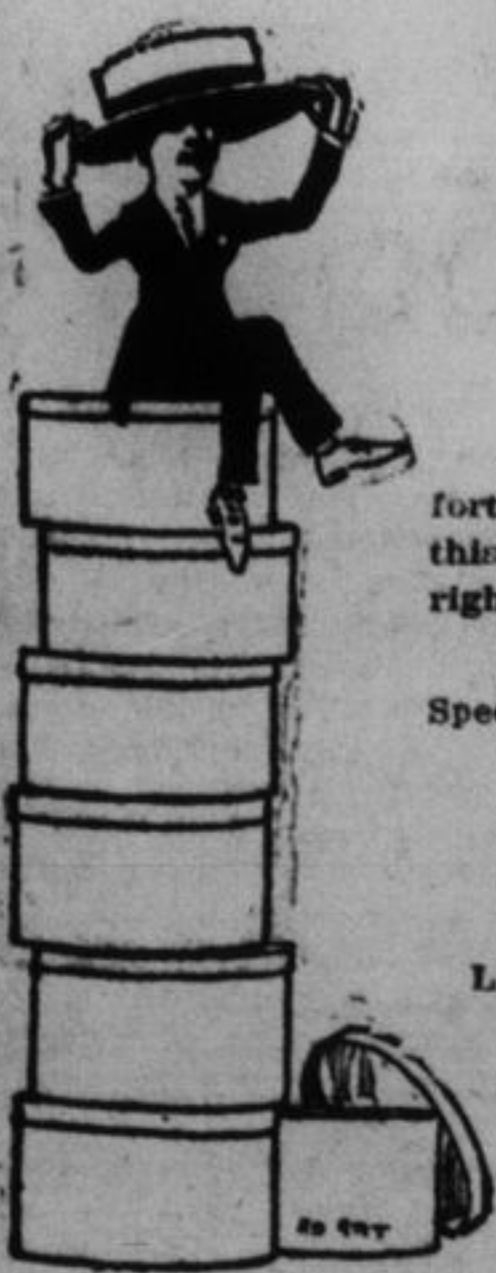
