

Deceased Born in Kingston-His Father Killed by Fall Off Elevator.

Russell Company, died at the General Marine hospital, St. Catharines, on Thursday, from injuries sustained in a fall through an open hatchway into the hold of the steamer Joyland on the drydock at Port Dalhousie Wednesday night.
