MANY BANK BRANCHES CLOSED DURING MAY

During the month of May Canadian chartered banks opened eight branches and closed 57, as against three opened and 21 closed in the previous month. Branches opened are the following: Enerco, Ltd., Cuba, Royal, Montreal, Sherbrooke street west and Hampton avenue, Union, and sub-branches: Niagara Falls, Centre, Ont., Royal; Pointe-à-la-Paix, Provinciale; Rustico, P. E. I., Royal; St. Come, Que., Hochelaga; St. Julien de Wolfstown, Que. Provinciale; Toronto, Dundas street and Runnymede road, Dominion. Branches in Canada now total 4,576; in Newfoundland, 45, and elsewhere, 155, or 4,776 in all, as compared with a total of 4,825 at the end of April.

COMMERCIAL NOTES.

The situation in refined sugar appears to be becoming stronger, and in some quarters predictions are made that the current season will witness a considerable advance in prices, with a possible scarcity. At the present time two of the refiners are withdrawn from the market, while the others are quoting \$7.34 per hundredweight for granulated, which is a substantial advance from the low point of \$66.24 reached about the beginning of May. The export trade in this commodity is very brisk just now, and large quantities of refined sugar are going out of the country. The large crop of fruit is expected to result in a big preserving season, which will obviously cause a bigger demand for sugar.

The arrival of a shipment of Canadian coal at the port of Providence, R.I., for the New Haven Railway, together with two cargoes from Charleston, S.C., is taken to mean that the New Haven anticipates no present coal strike to prevail for some considerable time. The shipment of Canadian coal was made from Sydney, N.S., and it is said is the first Canadian coal received at Providence for some time.

The Australian Government plans to settle 1,500 cotton growers in Central Queensland on 168,000 acres to increase the cultivation of cotton according to a report received by the Textile Division of the United States Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce. The land considered suitable for cotton is at present leased to graziers. The settlers will be expected to do some mixed farming, in addition to raising cotton. The British Imperial Government has been approached for a price guarantee on cotton that may be raised in those areas, it is reported.

There was an almost negligible decline in the cost of living in Canada during May, as arrived at by the Labor Department's investigators. The average cost at retail of a list of 29 staple foods was \$10.22, as compared with \$10.26 in April; \$12.25 in May, 1921; \$16.65 in 1920; \$11.82 in May, 1917, and \$7.43 in May, 1914. The total for food, fuel and rent for May, 1922 was \$20.57, as compared with \$20.66 for April, 1922; \$22.84 for May, 1921; \$28.44 for May, 1920; \$21.67 for May, 1919; \$18.50 for May, 1917, and \$14.21 for May 1914.

Directors of the Steel Company of Canada met in Toronto Thursday and declared the customary quarterly dividends of 1 1/4 per cent. on preferred and 1 1/2 per cent. on common, payable July 18. The stock market was not allowed the opportunity of giving and expression to this announcement, as the meeting was not completed until after the closing of the Exchange. The behavior of the stock has been quite normal and satisfactory, and there was no interruption in its movements that there would be any interruption in the dividend payments. The action of directors at yesterday's meeting was quiet in accord with public expectation.
