QUEEN'S SUMMER SCHOOL

Opened on Tuesday Morning—A record Attendance is Fully Expected.

Queen's summer school opened its thirteenth session on Tuesday morning. Registration started Monday and one hundred and fifty students arrived. Registration will continue all week, many more arriving to-day (Tuesday). The staff anticipate a record attendance this year, fully three hundred being expected to enroll for summer's course. Last year there were 28 students in attendance.

The lectures started Tuesday morning and the professors met the students to arrange hours for classes. The physical training classes also got under way, the Strathcona groups meeting to decide on the most suitable hour for classes. Miss Gladys Dickson, who is to teach folk dancing, interpretive dancing and ball room dancing, in association with the physical training course has arrived at the college. Her classes will be conducted in Grant hall while the Strathcona class will use the gymnasium.

The recreational part of the college life has also been considered by the athletic board and George Stewart has prepared several tennis courts on the lower campus which are as good as those on the middle campus. Programmes of athletics will be prepared by the student committees.

The members of the committee returned to Toronto, and will come back within the course of a week to cover the territory.

WON HIS DEGREE.

He is instructor of French at the R.M.C.
