An interesting story concerning the adventures of a young member of the famous Royal Marines, who happens to be visiting his brother in Kingston, was brought to light Tuesday morning, while the young sailor was in conversation with a representative of the Whig. His name and unit being A. E. Hicks, Royal Marine Light Infantry, and his service covers a period of eight years afloat. The young sailor has had many exciting adventures, not only during the war, but later, while on cruises in the Mediterranean, around South America, the West Indies, and the North Atlantic.

Mr. Hicks arrived in the city on Monday to spend a short leave of absence with his brother, Charles Hicks, formerly a member of the executive, G.W.V.A. His ship, the light cruiser Constance, one of the units of the British North Atlantic fleet, is now at Montreal, this port being one of many visited during a cruise which started in February.

The young sailor—he is only twenty-one—first went to sea in 1914, and he was on the cruiser Majestic on escort duty to the fleet of vessels which transported the First Canadian Contingent to England. Though neither was aware of the fact until over a year later, the older brother, Charles, was on the steamer Cassandra at this time as a member of the 2nd Battalion, C.E.F. Rather a peculiar coincidence occurred at the end of the war, when the two brothers returned to Canada, one looking forward to civilian life, on the steamer Saxonia, and the other a member of the Marines on the cruiser uke of Edinburgh. This latter vessel figured prominently in the Jutland engagement previous to this.

Young Hicks saw a great deal of service during the war, not the least of which were the unfortunate engagements at the Dardanelles. His ship, the Majestic, arrived there shortly after escorting the Canadian contingent across the Atlantic, and she was one of the three battleships sunk in the Straits. Hicks was one of the few survivors.

Mr. Hicks is paying his first visit to this part of Canada, and he is delighted with the country. He leaves on the 18th to rejoin his ship.

## IN MARINE CIRCLES

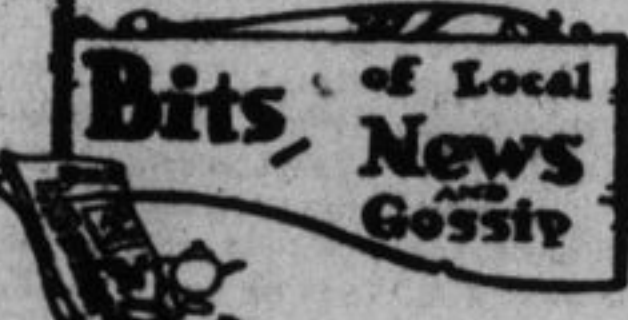
