ADDRESS ON DENTISTRY

By Dr. C. C. Nash Before the Members of Rotary Club on Friday.

Preventive dentistry was the subject of an excellent address by Dr. C. C. Nash before the Rotary Club at its weekly luncheon in the British American hotel on Friday. The speaker emphasized the necessity for the frequent inspection of children's teeth in order that the first permanent tooth, the six-year molar, might be taken care of until the remaining permanent teeth have erupted and lock together and give the normal shape to the jaw and face. The failure of the Kingston Board of Education to provide a dental clinic for children was referred to and the speaker showed that neglect of the teeth at any time, and particularly in childhood, resulted in needless pain and the loss of the power of mastication.

Dr. Nash confined his address to one phase of the subject, namely—preventive dentistry, and by means of charts illustrated what he had to say about the preservation of children's teeth. "The Board of Education in Kingston has fallen down," he said, "in the care of children's teeth." Twelve years ago the dentists of Kingston offered their services and examined all children: Those found needing treatment were given a card and referred to their family dentist. The work was done free of charge. It was found that 95 per cent. of all children need something done. An inspector was appointed for the schools and the work cost from \$300 to \$400 a year. There should be a children's dental clinic, for the important thing in children is to take care of the first permanent tooth, or what is known as the six-year molar. This tooth should be preserved until after the remaining permanent teeth have erupted and lock in the jaw giving it its normal shape. When this tooth is lost there is a permanent handicap. It has been demonstrated by dental clinics at orphanages, that children can grow up to twenty years without a cavity in any tooth, simply by carrying out a measure of preventive dentistry. Dr. Nash touched briefly on the ulcerated tooth and the suitable treatment.

President L. A. Guild tendered a vote of thanks to Dr. Nash for his highly interesting address. During the roll call the following guests were introduced: W. J. Kearns, Ottawa, district governor, Dr. J. Roblin, Toronto, Mr. Mabee, Lawrence Newlands, Portland, Oregon.

Rotarian songs were heartily sung under the direction of Harold Singleton, and the guests received a very warm welcome from the members. Governor Kearns, in a brief address, indicated the spirit of international Rotary as exemplified during the international convention which he attended. "For a Rotarian, nothing is too much trouble," he declared and gave many pleasing instances when Rotarians overcame the seeming impossible to oblige fellow Rotarians. Rotarian Lawrence Newlands, Portland, Oregon, an old Kingston boy, was introduced by President Guild. He gave a short talk on conditions in the Pacific coast. There business is prosperous, all industries are working full time and there is a prospect of a shortage of labor here before the end of the summer.
