Napanee's Tax Rate.
At a special meeting of the Napanee council, the important matter of receiving the estimated receipts and expenditures and striking the tax rate for the current year was dealt with. Out of the total estimated receipts of \$98,474.62, debentures and interest consume \$20,129.65, county rate, \$14,208.00, schools, \$25,993.00, making a total of \$60,330.65, or nearly two-thirds of the total tax. Needless to say the council has no control over this amount. The balance, \$38,143.97, is divided up into the different committee appropriation grants, salaries, charities and miscellaneous.
