Some Lettuce!

Hunter, a former evangelist, who conducted the services in the Baptist church during the latter part of June, has accepted the call of the congregation, and will take charge of the field here from the first Sunday in August.

Purchased an Island.
Albert N. Gilman, Rochester, N. Y., has purchased from M. A. Hudson, Syracuse, N. Y., the island near Grenell on which some years ago was the Pullman hotel. Mr. Gilman plans to build a California style bungalow on the island. He will have a connecting bridge from his island to Grenell and has already engaged a landscape gardener who will make the place one of the beauty spots of the river. A yacht house will also be built to house Mr. Gilman's new speed boat.

Doctor Enters State Hospital.
Papers have been issued by Judge J. Frank LaRue committing Dr. Philip E. Rossiter, Cape Vincent, N. Y., to the St. Lawrence State hospital at Ogdensburg, N. 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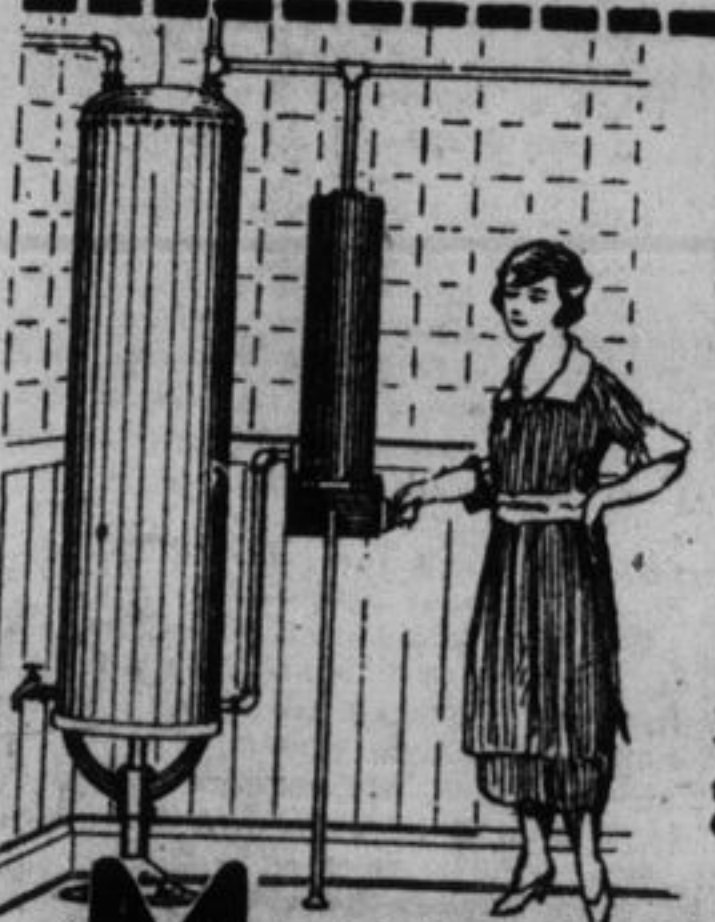
