Efficient Housekeeping

Canning Some of The Favorite Fruits. The following sirup is the proper one to use in canning berries of all sorts, currants and pears:

To Can Berries: Dewberries, blackberries, raspberries and Loganberries are canned in exactly the same way. "Sterilize" quart-size glass jars (by "sterilize" I mean boil the empty jars and their glass covers in clear water for 10 or 12 minutes) then drain them and pack them full of freshly-picked whole berries.

Gooseberries are canned in exactly the same way, except that they are processed in the wash-boiler in quart-size jars for 20 minutes instead of for 12.
