CITIZENS MUST GET TOGETHER TO CURE

The Class-Conscious Tendencies of Other Groups of People.

"There is no reasonable standpoint from which the multiplicity of class-conscious political groups existing in Canada today can be justified," said Hon. Dr. J. W. Edwards in an address before the Kiwanis Club at the weekly luncheon in the Hotel Frontenac on Monday, when he was the principal speaker. "The cure for the political problem presented by these class-conscious groups is to be found in the uniting of all citizens who have anything at stake in the country," he declared.

Taking for his subject "Politics and Problems" Hon. Dr. Edwards opened his address by a definition of politics and showed the distinction between persons who view politics from conviction, and those to whom politics is a disease. Those who hold to certain political principles from conviction are disposed to examine and acknowledge any good found in their opponents, but the man whose politics is a disease can see no gain of political wisdom or a shred of virtue in others.

"I believe that every citizen desires to assist in promoting such policies and plans as will best promote the welfare of Canada. I believe that the birth and baptism of Canada into nationhood was brought about on the battlefields of France and Flanders. Previous to the great war we had been inclined to rely upon the empire in our external relationships, and also, to some extent, upon our neighbor to the south where the same ideals as ours prevail. We assumed a colonial attitude rather than a national one previous to 1914 and the world in general regarded us as possessing colonial status. Our work in the war changed all that and the world acknowledges Canada's place in the world of nations. It was as if a boy awoke from a long sleep to find himself a giant with limited experience in world affairs, but called to the task of administering a vast country but in the midst of political disintegration and with the class-conscious cry in the air.

"To my mind the most serious menace to this country lies in the multiplicity of class-conscious political groups whose existence cannot be justified from any reasonable standpoint. Take the United Farmers of Ontario. They were started, and reached their highest point of development, when the farmers were in better financial prosperity than ever before in the history of Canada. There is no theory advanced by them that could not be advanced through the old parties. But we have Messrs. Wood and Morrison advocating class-conscious government. This is ridiculous and pernicious. To have good government we must have a government checked by a good opposition, and Hon. Mr. Drury, premier of Ontario, admits himself that group government is not permanent.

Paralysis of Efforts.

"Some people attribute our troubles to the war, but I do not know of any that we did not have before the war.

"Except the O.T.A.," interjected a voice in the audience.

"That's true," replied the speaker.

"With some of us that is a problem, but we had our difficulties under the two-party system that have since been accentuated into problems. I see in the multiplicity of parties the paralysis of our efforts. True, the railway problem was increased by the war, but it was in existence long before and was only coming to the point where drastic action was required. What progress has been made within the last six months? What can you expect with not two parties, but with three parties at Ottawa all of which have a different attitude toward the matters at issue? We have actually minority governments in Ottawa, in Ontario and Manitoba. Can these governments be called responsible governments? I say no. In Europe the line between those who would build up and those who would pull down is very clearly defined. In Canada all of our parties might be divided in only two classes, the stable and the unstable. I think that we stand in need of a revival of the spirit manifested by the people of Canada during the war, a spirit that led men to lay aside partisan differences and unite for a great purpose. If it was true in time of war, it is true now when those who have a stake in the country recognized the need for stable government. After all there is little between Conservatives and Liberals if you accept the term radical. We have no Conservatives without some radicals and you have no Liberals without some Conservative elements. If you take the definition of Conservatives and Liberals in their literal sense, the most Conservative government Canada ever had was the Liberal government from 1896 to 1911, and the most Liberal government was that from 1911 to 1922. In proof of this was there ever more radical act than that which conferred the franchise on women?

"The old parties have allowed themselves to be divided on what is an imaginary difference. We must get the people who have grown up in this country closer together and one step we should take would be the establishment of a permanent tariff board or commission, like the railway board, that would be advisory to parliament. There are not many people in favor of free trade but they are dissatisfied without reliable information regarding the manufacturing

industries of this country and in the world.

The Two Real Problems.

"There are only two real problems before the people of Canada calling for a little systematic effort to dissolve them. The first is immigration. Immigrants living and coming here settle in colonies and groups and they have brought and planted here the very things they came away from in Europe. These people should have been given to Canadians, and for this purpose, I would not grant a land patent until they consented to accept the customs of Canada and had their children attend Canadian schools. The second problem is to bring about a closer union of the two great races in Canada. This cannot be done by compromise and home-entour tours, but only by deliberations over the council board. I would have a federal board of education to be composed of representatives of all provinces—a sort of clearing house for the study of the ideas of our own and of other countries with a view to bringing about uniformity in education. I think the British North America Act was a mistake respecting its treatment of the matter of education. There should be but one history for all provinces.

A vote of thanks was tendered to Hon. Dr. Edwards on a motion of Prof. Day, seconded by W. McCullum.

Approve of Silver Making Firm.

The usual roll call was dispensed with and President Noble Stacey introduced R. E. Burns and Dr. W. W. Sands who reported on the firm of Aiyward and Stanley, manufacturers of Norman Silverware, who desire to locate their plant in Kingston. Kiwanian Burns recommended the company to the most favorable considerations of the citizens after investigation into its financial condition. His report was as follows:

"At the request of the Industries Committee I have investigated the balance sheets and operating statement of this company for a period of four months from January 1st to April 30th, 1922, as certified to by Oscar Hudson & Company, Chartered Accountants, Toronto. I have also discussed the financial situation with Mr. Aiyward and now attach to this letter a condensed balance sheet showing what the position of the company would be when they have moved to Kingston, providing they had received \$30,000 for new subscriptions.

"I have assumed that it would cost them \$3,000 to move the plant and that there would be a loss due to operating overhead of \$1,500 during the time that the plant was idle.

"I have also prepared a statement showing what the cash situation would be and on the assumption that the deferred liability amounting to about \$26,500 could be spread over a period of from six to eighteen months, they would have a clear working capital of \$12,476 for present expansion.

"I would consider this a very fair manufacturing proposition and one that should recommend itself to business men or investors who are willing to take the ordinary chances which go with any investment in a manufacturing concern.

"The reasons given for moving to Kingston are sound and if this industry could be secured for the city while it is not very large it would be an important addition to our industrial life.

"I would suggest that the subscriptions taken from Kingston should be conditional on a total subscription of \$30,000 of which \$20,000 should be subscribed here and \$10,000 is already subscribed. I understand, by the customers of the present company, and the further condition that the subscriptions are only good in the event of the company moving to Kingston.

"With these safeguards I would recommend this to the favorable consideration of the citizens."
