News Off The Ticker.

U. S. Senator Daugherty endorses as logical the Hooper plan for rationing coal.

Cars will be moved for the coal mines that adhere to the government's price policy.

The Anglo-Persian Oil Co. has been granted petroleum rights for the whole of Macedonia.

The Standard Oil of California has reduced crude oil twenty-five cents a barrel.

Allan Ryan's liabilities are re-

duced from \$32,000,000 to \$18,000,000 owing to duplications in bankruptcy schedules of which \$14,000,000 is secured.

Coal mining is partially resumed in Pennsylvania, Illinois, Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma and Arkansas.

Wall Street Journal—Nothing has happened in the economic situation, since the industrial average reached a new high last week, to change the view that far-seeing operators would welcome a reaction in the general market affording better purchasing opportunities.

WILL BE HERE FRIDAY.

Special Committee Investigating Conditions at the Hotels.

At the special meeting of the city council held on Monday night, Mayor Corbett stated that he had received a letter stating that the special committee of the Ontario legislature investigating hotel accommodation, and conditions, would arrive in Kingston on Friday at 6 p.m. and that a conference would be held in the Mayor's office at 8 p.m.

Stayed Progress of Pest.

The Agricultural representatives of the Ontario Department of Agriculture writes that the appearance of the army worm in Lennox and Addington and in Pelee was noted early, and it looks as if local measures in each case have the situation under control. For the eastern visitation, the Lennox and Addington representative says: "Three outbreaks of the army worm have occurred in this county. In each case, we have investigated and successfully controlled the army worm by poison bran mixture. I estimate that this mixture was seventy-five per cent. effective three days after first treatment. However, we were fortunate in being informed of the outbreaks at their very first appearance and in no case have the worms advanced more than twelve feet."
