WINNERS ANNOUNCED IN FIELD CROP COMPETITION

J. D. Morris Carries Off Highest Honors for Second Time—Splendid Showing Made

On Wednesday morning, R. J. Bushell announced the winners in the field crop competition of five acres of white oats, which is held in conjunction with the Kingston Industrial Exhibition. The list shows the points obtained. The highest points awarded in the province were 95, which have been very rarely obtained, while 93 points have also been awarded in this competition, which was reached by J. D. Morris, manager of the Coverdale Farm at Lemoine's Point. This is the second year for Mr. Morris to win in this competition. There were 24 competitors and there was a very keen contest, and great interest was shown by all taking part. The first seven winners are obliged to exhibit a sheaf at the Kingston Industrial exhibition and failing to do so they forfeit their award in the field. Those obtaining 85 points or over are eligible to compete for larger prizes offered by the Canadian National exhibition, at Toronto.

Mr. Monaghan, of Wellington Ont., Prince Edward County, was the judge. He states that in his long experience of judging for the department of agriculture, that he never saw such a fine lot of oats as the townships of Pittsburgh and Kingston have shown this year, and this is something for Frontenac to be proud of. This is the leading feature of the Kingston Industrial exhibition.

2,000,000 ARE IDLE THROUGH STRIKES

Cost of Living 24 p.c. Below 1920 Peak—\$8,000,000 a Day Being Lost.

New York, July 26.—More than two million persons are voluntarily idle in the United States through strikes, according to the Weekly Review of Industrial Conditions, which states that the railroad, coal mining, and textile strikes are having a "depressing effect on business generally."

The board says the cost of living is now 24 per cent. below the peak reached in June, 1920, and that in the wage adjustment during the last month the "decreases slightly exceeded the number of increases."

"Since July 100,000,000 man hours of work have been lost each week," it was stated. "With the average wage of labor taken at 50 cents an hour the wage loss alone since the first of the month has been in excess of \$10,000,000, and is proceeding at the rate of over \$8,000,000 a day. This, in effect, means a serious contraction in purchasing power which, in turn, may have its effect on future employment and general business conditions. The situation constitutes a grave national problem."
