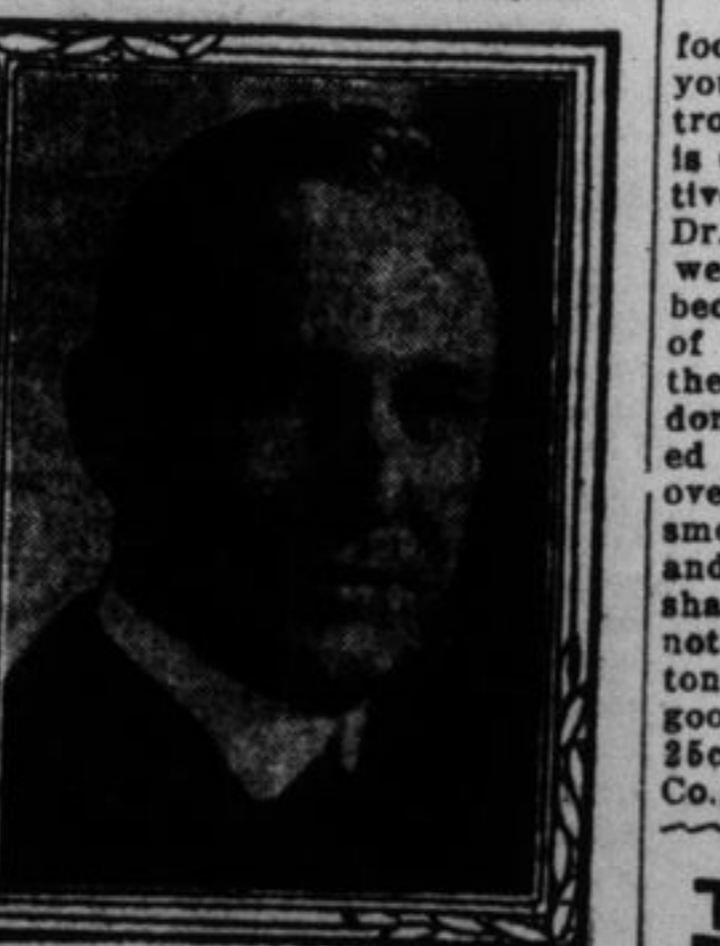
The Mercury Drops.

Holsteins For Japan.

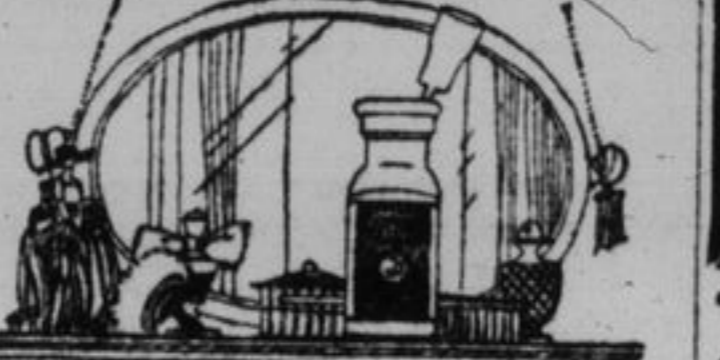
