QUEEN'S SUMMER SCHOOL HELD ANNUAL MEETING

C. A. Lapp, Ottawa, Elected President—Report on Curtis Fund.

The annual meeting of Queen's Summer School Association was held in Convocation hall, Thursday evening, at which the annual elections of officers took place, and important resolutions regarding the J. K. Curtis memorial fund were passed.

The report of the Curtis memorial fund committee was given by C. R. Duprau, who assisted by an energetic committee, have this summer raised the fund from \$400 to \$1,260, at which the fund now stands. The districts have responded well to the appeal for the fund to establish a scholarship in memory of the late J. K. Curtis, who was one of the most loyal advocates and workers for the success of the school.

Conditions to control the award of the scholarship were suggested by the committee, and approved by the meeting. The most important of these was that the revenue of the fund as deposited with the registrar of the university should constitute the award. The scholarship shall be awarded by a committee of members of the faculty of the summer school and also students. It shall go to students who graduate in arts after an extra mural course including a summer course. The scholarship shall be awarded on a basis of sixty-five per cent. for scholastic attainment, twenty-five per cent. for service as exemplified in the life and work of the late Mr. Curtis, and ten per cent. for athletic ability.

A prize has been offered by the director of the school, Dr. W. T. MacClement, for the best essay on the subject, "The services of the late J. K. Curtis to Queen's summer school." This will be awarded this summer. The scholarship will also be given this fall, the award being made to those who graduate in either fall or spring examinations, and have filled the other requirements.

The report of the nominating committee was adopted after much discussion on the method of election. The following is the executive for the ensuing year: Hon.-president, C. E. The Provincial representatives are, British Columbia, P. H. Sheffler, Fernie; Alberta, G. W. Cromie, Calgary; Saskatchewan, R. Gillis, Vankar; Manitoba, Miss M. Anderson, Winnipeg; Northern Ontario, Miss J. M. Scott, North Bay; Southern Ontario, J. A. Partridge, Toronto; Quebec, J. W. Bruny, Quebec, New Brunswick, S. S. Nason, St. John's; Nova Scotia, A. V. The summer school students have been invited by Principal and Mrs. Taylor and the staff of the summer school to a garden party to be held on the lawn in front of the Principal's residence on August 9th.

One of the interesting facts brought out at the meeting was that the summer school this year has made the largest increase in attendance of any year. It made an advance of 25 per cent.
