Efficient Housekeeping

Helpful Hints From Readers.

It makes one feel that it's a pretty generous-hearted old world, when busy housekeepers stop in their work to take time to write me a letter containing some household hint that will help other women. The following are splendid:

Anonymous: "I noticed in your column that Mrs. J. M. would like to know how to wash out lettering on four bags. The following is a method used by a certain biscuit factory (who use flour bags for pan holders): Rip the stitching, then dip the bags in cold water (soft water preferred). Rub any good laundry soap on the lettering, roll up and let soak a while, then wash out and boil in a strong suds. After this treatment, the lettering will be gone. If not, repeat the process."

M. K.: "I recently noticed that one of your readers wanted to know how to bring back lustre to amber beads which have been washed. I simply put a few drops of olive oil on a soft cloth and polish the beads gently (do not unstring them). Then I roll up the beads in the cloth and leave for some time, till they have absorbed the oil. They will be as bright as when new."

E. D.: "I read in your column that 'Theeera A.' wanted to know how to remove scorch stains from a dress. I would like to have her know of this method, which my husband used when he worked for a tailor, some time ago: If the scorch is not so bad that the material is not burnt, the scorch stain will come out by steaming. To do this, lay a wet piece of cloth over the scorched spot, and iron over the wet cloth. Do this again and again till the scorch stain is entirely gone."
