WROTE A NOTE SAYING HE WAS ABOUT TO DIE

But Thomas David Was Later Arrested on a Charge of Vagrancy.

"I am going to die. Bury my bones in Green Bush cemetery at Picton."
These lines were written in ink on an envelope advertising the Kingston Industrial Fair, by one Thomas David, Picton, well known to the Kingston police, and many other citizens, presumably some time on Friday, and mailed to the Kingston Standard by the writer. The letter, with the message, reached the local newspaper office on Saturday morning and was handed over to the police authorities.

But Thomas did not die, however. When his message reached the police station, it was found that Poor Old Thomas was in the "lockup" on a charge of vagrancy, having been taken into custody on Friday night by Constable Beaupre.

Thomas David has been before the magistrate a score or more times, on a charge of vagrancy. He has been sent to his home in Picton many times, but, like the old story about the cat, he always came back. He has a warm spot in his heart for Kingston, and even though disturbed by the police so many times, he is always ready to risk being arrested as long as he can breathe the nice fresh air in our midst. On one occasion, not long ago, when Thomas had been sent home to Picton on the train, he started back to Kingston immediately on his arrival in Picton, and then when he got back to Kingston he telephoned the police to say that he was back again. For real nerve, Thomas "takes the cake."

Got Sixty Days in Jail.
Thomas David was arraigned before Ald. R. E. Kent, who was on the bench in the police court on Saturday morning, and was sentenced to sixty days in jail. When Thomas found that he was up against it, he pleaded hard for a chance to go back to Picton, but there was "nothing doing." The acting magistrate informed Thomas that after he did his "bit" at the county jail, he was free to go back to Picton. The accused was not at all pleased over the sentence, and as per usual did a lot of grumbling. He has had so many chances that the authorities have used up their patience on him.

A visitor who celebrated on Friday with an expensive bottle, had his holiday expenses added to when the court imposed the usual fine of \$10 and costs.

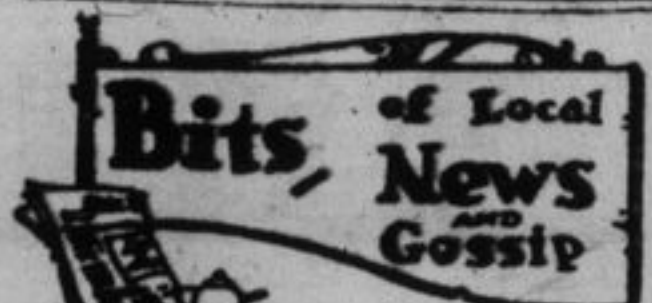
Friday evening proved a rather disappointing evening for the radio fan. The presence of thunderstorms in the near vicinity of the city caused a lot of interference namely QRM, and continued until around 9:30 when the air cleared somewhat and several stations were heard. Schenectady, N.Y., was very good the last part of the first Friday evening concert and the second concert was heard throughout its entirety. A few of the numbers played were "Just a Little Love Song," "Ship of Dreams," "Nutcracker Suite," "Smiling Through," "Come to the Fair," "Atta Baby," "Weep No More My Mammy" and several others. At the close of this concert WGY requested cards as to suggestions for improving their broadcasting programmes. Springfield, Mass., the Westinghouse station, WBE, was also heard testifying and came in very good. KDKA, Pittsburg, Pa., and WJZ, Newark, N.J., came in for a lot of praise towards the end of their concert. The Sunday programmes will include WHAM, Rochester, with a church sermon and music at 3 p.m., KDKA will have Radio Chapel at 4 p.m. and 7:30 the community Open Air Services from the Wilkesburg Federation of Churches, Wilkesburg, Pa., WJZ will have radio chapel at 8:30 p.m., conducted by Rev. F. W. Dickinson, House of Prayer, Newark, N.J., at 6:30 p.m., readings and records from the "Bible Book that Sings" by Ralph Mayher, at 7 p.m., reading for the older boys and girls, including backwoods tales by G. D. Roberts' book, "The Feet of the Partitive," at 8:15, a musical programme by Gertrude Remyson, dramatic soprano, Eugene Doreaux, pianist and accompanist. The programme will include "Birth of Morn," "In an Old-Fashioned Town," "Last Night," "The Lilac Tree," etc.

DEAN STARR IN LONDON.

A Newspaper Man Writes About the Kingston Rector.

The following appears in the "Diary of a Man About Town," in the London Evening News of August 5th: "I have had the pleasure of again encountering Dean Starr, of Ontario."

"The Dean is a genial bachelor, and is in England again in the hope of restoring his physical health. He happened to be in London the day the war broke out. A member of the Canadian militia from his youth up, his anxiety to be doing something prompted him to offer his services to the War Office that same day. They were accepted, and Dean Starr became chaplain to the Irish Guards. "Pretty soon his congregation in Kingston, Ontario, became restive at his absence. The Bishop of London, knowing something of the impression the Dean had created among the Irish Guards, wrote to the Bishop of Ontario suggesting that the Dean should be permitted to remain. However, it was eventually thought better that he should return to Canada, and before he left the Guards presented him with a set of communion vessels."
