FOUND GUILTY OF HAVING A STILL IN OPERATION

William Neddow, Hinchinbrook, Was Caught by Officers on Saturday.

Found guilty on the charge of having a still for the purpose of manufacturing liquor, contrary to the Inland Revenue Act, William Neddow, township of Hinchinbrooke, was sentenced to one month in jail and \$200 fine before Justices of the Peace Allison and Cannon, Monday morning. Six months will be the penalty if the fine is not paid. The case followed a raid made on Saturday by License Inspector McCammon, Excise Officer W. J. Friezell, Provincial Constables Clark and Marshall, and County Constable Tomlinson, Sharbot Lake.

On exhibit at the court was a still of very crude design made out of an old wooden pail. When the officers approached the house raided, the still was thrown out of the window landing about forty feet away in the garden. To reach the house the party had to walk about four miles over roads impassable to motor traffic.

FAMOUS STABLE DESTROYED.

Savage Barns, in Which Dan Patch Trained, Burned.

Savage, Minn., Aug. 21.—The old Savage barn in which Dan Patch trained, reigned as king of pacers, and died, located on the former M. W. Savage stock farm near here, is in ruins with an estimated loss of \$100,000.

The fire, caused by spontaneous combustion in twenty tons of alfalfa stored in the barn which covered four acres destroyed it. Thirty-five head of pure bred Holstein cattle, valued at \$125,000, were saved. One cow, valued at \$1,500, was burnt. The burning of the old horse stable marked the passing of a landmark familiar to scores of horsemen throughout the United States and Canada.

Originally built in 1904 as a home for Dan Patch, famous king of the pacers, the stable was gradually increased in size until quarters were available for 300 horses.

One of the features was a half mile enclosed race track around the stable. It was in this stable that Dan Patch died, July 11th, 1916, just thirty-two hours before the death of Mr. Savage, his owner.
