you that they have caught up on

deliveries and the anticipated in-

creased demand of the fall and winter months will be handled

with ease. Some of these stock selling schemes liken radio to the great inventions of the past, such as the sewing machine, telephone and other public utilities that have been developed.

Heed by the wary reader should be given to the fact that radio is a well founded industry, and, although new, has been steadily developed for years at the cost of millions. The patents on the most recent development, are still good for many years, and held by large corporations capable of handling their products in vast


