JAMES K. HACKETT GUEST OF THE KING AND QUEEN

Noted Canadian-American Actor and His Wife Honored Overseas.

The editor of the Whig has received an interesting letter from James K. Hackett, the noted Canadian-American actor and his many friends in Kingston and on Wolfe Island, where he was born, will be pleased to hear of his good fortune during the past two years in England and France. It is of interest to note that Mr. Hackett gave his first professional performance of "Othello" at the Grand Opera house here on Sept. 7th, 1914. In his letter Mr. Hackett says: "Among the many honors which it has been my good fortune to receive on the continent was the fact that Mrs. Hackett and I were the guests of Their Majesties at their garden party at Buckingham Palace, and in addition to that I had the pleasure of being presented to His Majesty and had a most charming and informal talk with him. Afterwards we were presented to Her Majesty, and we each enjoyed several minutes conversation with her. Their majesties were graciousness personified."

Born on Wolfe Island. The British Whig of Saturday, September 11th, 1869, has the following:

"Born, 6th September, inst., upon Wolfe Island, C. W., where the infant's mother is now sojourning, a son to James H. Hackett, a native and resident of New York City, and who is rightfully, according to Burke's Peerage, 'Baron Hackett, of Hackettstown, Co. Carlow, and Shelton Abbey, Co. Wicklow, Ireland, descended from 'Haket,' one of the great Norman Barons who came over with William the First, and whose name still appears heading the Comyn's Roll of his six and thirty Nobles and Generals, inscribed A.D. 1066, upon the Pillar erected at Battle Abbey, near Hastings, England. One of his Progeny accompanied Henry the Second in his famous Irish expedition, and obtained vast estates and seigniories, and his descendants became, generation after generation, Parliamentary Barons and potent magnates in Ireland."

In 1839, the London Court Journal, after the death of the late Edmond Baron Hackett, referring to the attested Family Pedigree, Her Majesty's College, Castle Dublin, announced:—'James Henry Hackett, of New York, U.S., the true inheritor of that ancestral dignity, and also the sole surviving representative of the Family and of the original and illustrious line of Feudal Barons who lost their estates by reason of Revolutions and the Reformation, and are now confined among the Extinct Peerages of Scotland, Ireland and England.'

"So that between their title and low name There's nothing differs but the outward fame."

James H. Hackett is also the father—by his first marriage—of the Hon. John K. Hackett, noted as an able lawyer, and eminently just judge, and also the popular Recorder of the City of New York.

Result of the standing field crop competition of ensilage corn, of five acres or over, held in conjunction with the Kingston industrial agricultural association, 1922; W. J. Casselman, Morrisburg, departmental judge.

Berry, Kingston Mills, 84 points, 808. 6th, Thomas Doyle, R.R. 1, Kingston, 83 1/2 points, 806. 7th, A. E. Franklin, R.R. 1, 83 points, 804.

The above prize winners are obliged to exhibit a sheaf of the corn at the Kingston Industrial Exhibition, Sept. 19th-23rd. Below is the scoring of the other nine fields that were judged: Charina Walker, R.R. Portsmouth, 80 points. James Henderson & Son, R.R. Portsmouth, 77 1/2 points. James Bradden, Kingston Mills, 76 1/2 points. A. C. Day, R. R. Portsmouth 76 points. James Shortall, R.R. Kingston, 74 1/2 points. D. C. Rodgers, R.R. 1, Kingston, 73 1/2 points. W. J. Hunter, Kingston Mills, 73 points. Edwin Bradden, R.R. 1, Kingston, 69 1/2 points. A. M. Smith, Westbrook, 48 points. The above are eligible to show a sheaf of corn at the Kingston Industrial Exhibition. The standing field crop competition of oats and corn held in conjunction with the Kingston Industrial Exhibition, has the largest entry list of any association in the province, showing conclusively that the farmers of Frontenac are not only behind the exhibition itself, but are

also behind the field crop competition. This is another good feature of the fair.
