**Will Do Judging Inside.**  
The live stock judging will be done inside this year for the first time in the history of the Canadian National Exhibition. The Coliseum makes this possible. Night horse shows will also be given in the new \$1,000,000 building.

**Died in General Hospital.**  
Cyrenus Huffman passed away at the General hospital on Thursday night where he was under treatment. He was a resident of Moscow and was seventy years of age. The remains were sent to Moscow by James Reid, undertaker.

**Military Burial Contract.**  
The contract for military funerals under the control of the department of soldiers civil establishment which expired on Aug. 31st, has been awarded to the firm of James Reid and Company, undertakers, which had it last year.

**Condition is Serious.**  
The condition of Archdeacon Bliss, rector of St. John's church, Smith's Falls, remains unchanged. He suffers from a paralytic stroke, is confined to bed and cannot speak. He is nursed at the country home at Port Elmsley.

**Strew Tacks on Road.**  
Hundreds of tacks were found a few days ago strewn on St. Lawrence street in Merriokville village after a dance held in the armories. Numerous autoists suffered punctures as the result of the action of a person with a perverted sense of humor.

**Barn and Contents Destroyed.**  
A large frame barn, owned by Robert Heaslip situated at Sherwood Springs, was destroyed by fire, which was first noticed by residents nearby. How the fire originated is unknown. The season's crop was destroyed in the blaze and the loss of the owner will be heavy. Some insurance was carried.

**Labor Holiday Events.**  
With the Labor picnic at the fair grounds on Monday afternoon, besides the numerous attractions of Napanee and Clayton, N.Y., there will be no end of diversion for Kingstonians over the holiday. A number of local people are also expecting to spend the week-end in Toronto.

**Died at Shannonville.**  
Mrs. James Toppings, Shannonville, passed away last Thursday and was laid to rest in Deseronto cemetery. Rev. Mr. Oreggan had charge of the remains. Mrs. Toppings had been ill for a number of years. She leaves a husband, one son Roy, and one little daughter Helen, aged ten. She will be much missed in the church where she was a willing worker.

**Will Deliver Addresses.**  
The Canadian Social Hygiene Association has invited two prominent members of the French delegation to give a series of lectures to the Association of French-speaking physicians of North America, meeting in Montreal on Sept. 7th; in Canada Kingston is on the itinerary. Drs. Finard and Gaston will be the lecturers.

**Methodist District Meeting.**  
The fall district meeting of the Kingston district of the Montreal Methodist conference will be held in the city next Wednesday. In the

evening, Rev. Dr. Endicott, general secretary of the foreign missions department of the Methodist church, is to be the speaker at a banquet being held to initiate the missionary campaign. It is likely that a prominent layman will also address the meeting.

**Ill in Hospital.**  
Mr. Ward, the only male student at the model school, is ill at the General hospital with typhoid fever. His family has recently moved to the city with Winnipeg and are residing on Ellerbeck street. His brother is also confined to the hospital with a similar complaint. They are slowly improving. The disease was not contracted here.

**Now Owns Coal Company.**  
Canada Steamship Lines, Limited, is now the owner of the entire capital stock of the Century Coal Company, Limited. Heretofore the steamship company has been in control of Century Coal, by reason of ownership of two-thirds of the capital stock. The remaining third has now been acquired, and the whole company belongs to the steamship company.

**More in Fifth Form.**  
It is expected that with the opening of school Tuesday the fifth form at the collegiate institute will have a considerably increased attendance over last year. Last year there was an increase over the year before. The increase expected this year is due to the stiffening of the university requirements which now makes a full matriculation standing necessary for entrance.

**Buys Chicago Home.**  
The Rt. Rev. Charles P. Anderson, Episcopal bishop of the diocese of Chicago and a native of Oxford Mills, has just purchased one of the finest residences on Drexel Boulevard, Chicago, for the sum of \$25,000. Bishop Anderson recently left for Portland, Oregon, at the head of a party of ecclesiastical officials, which he organized to attend the Protestant Episcopal officials' convention at Portland.

**William J. Montgomery Dead.**  
Word has just been received of the death in far-off Wellington, New Zealand, on June 5th last, of William J. Montgomery. His passing was sudden, death occurring from heart failure while he was seated in a chair in his home. The late Mr. Montgomery was born in Pembroke,

a son of the late John H. Montgomery, and was in his forty-sixth year. He first left Pembroke 28 years ago returning ten years ago for a visit with friends. He leaves a widow and one son in New Zealand, and two brothers and three sisters, as follows: Allan, in Wellington, N.Z.; Alex. in Sudbury; Mrs. George E. Beatty, Winnipeg; Mrs. David S. Cone, Brockville, and Mrs. O. T. Mulligan, Pembroke.
